



Block of the Month

"Wild at Heart"

The theme for the 2014 Block of the Month (BOM) Program is "Good Foundations." With a focus on

paper piecing, we started the year with a very simple block, "Squares in Squares." This month we'll practice working with odd shaped pieces.

Last month, Phyllis Gallaway offered us a great Technique Sharing Workshop (TSW) on the basics of paper piecing. A video of her presentation will



be posted on our blog in the near future if you need a refresher. Be sure to plan on staying for Phyllis's follow up TSW in February when she will explain some of the more complex possibilities with paper piecing.

The February Block of the Month is "Wild at Heart." The color combinations and style of fabric can be whatever inspires you. A reminder of a few ground rules:

- Most blocks offered to you will finish at no larger than 6" square so they can be printed on one sheet of paper.
- Leave the paper foundation on the back of the block for the winners of the block to remove.
- If you want to trim your block square, cut beyond the ¼" seam line.
- If you are printing on your own printer, be sure the printer is set for "Actual Size."
- Print directly from the .pdf that you can download from our website..
- Do not "copy" the pattern; the copy function on your printer is very likely to distort the pattern.

Paper piecing is an excellent brain exercise ... it takes a while to get used to thinking backward!

What a lovely mix of Ladies - from beginner to expert - and a full house, too. I didn't count heads but I estimated 24 students. Sandra was attentive to each of us, even doting sometimes. Her applique patterns were clear and concise. Her supplies and kits were not only top drawer but fairly priced. I found her instructions easy to follow and understand. Her demeanor was collected and calming. I give the workshop five stars, in part because of the attentions of our amazing workshop team Joanie B and Genelle V. Of the 33 workshops I have taken this team is, in my opinion, among the best when it comes to information distribution and care-taking. Brava, dolls!

Approximately nine months of the year Santa Rosa Quilt Guild sponsors a guest speaker on the Third Thursday at the Scottish Rite Center, followed by a workshop the day after, Friday, at the Luther Burbank Art and Garden Center located at 2050 Yulupa Ave, Santa Rosa, CA. The Program and Workshop (P&W) chair(s) commit to two years of service, the first year is booking and contracts and the second hosting given teachers. There are myriad details not mentioned in this brief overview. Just know that gifted teachers and smooth workshops don't just happen, these are labors of love.

Friday, January 17. The day began a crisp 24 degrees but by noon had warmed to 70 degrees. The majority of students arrived by the designated 8:30 for set-up only to find the room ready for instruction. Sandra's 'Baltimore Album' quilt was hung for inspiration and tutelage, her store ready for shopping, patterns and kits set to be engaged. Our P&W team made a few announcements such as the restroom locations, cell phones on mute, and lunch orders needed no later than 10 for an 11:45 break. Then the workshop began.

We gathered around Sandra at the front of the room where she shared the details and distribution of the patterns and kits, the goals to reach, how the day would proceed, and how she would meet each of us at our own level of comfort and experience. There were two kits available for purchase, both in the same pattern with appliqued roses or ribbon roses. I chose ribbon roses while my table mate, a new member, Jeanie, chose the applique persuasion. We shared an iron and wonderful conversation all day. It is a treat to engage new members, make new friends, and get our "learn on" in such a warm environment.

One of my favorite things about workshop days is the food. Just outside the kitchen into the main hall is a round table. By 9 am the table is bulging with January 2014 yum-yums. For example, Jeanie made chocolate chip cookies, one batch with nuts, one without. Someone brought miniature whole grain muffins that were so delicious I consumed more than my share even bringing several home, like a squirrel hiding a nut for the future... (If I had been a wise squirrel I would have noticed the name and brand of these amazing treats for future information.) In any case, by the lunch break I was feeling fat - so fat I passed on the Werther's Originals hard butterscotch candies!

Also by lunch, the 19 leaves of my rose vine were ready for applique. Silk edges turned crisp with starch, points hidden using my new stiletto, veins painted and shadowed with extraordinary inks. I finally have the hang of turned edge. I am so proud of myself. I have struggled with finishing edges. They take time and attention. Now I may be mature enough to move forward in quality as opposed to quantity in my quilting journey. That's progress.

Jeanie and I were delighted to have Sandra join us for lunch, another treat. Most of the class enjoyed their lunches on the garden patio in the fresh air so it was all the more special to have Sandra stay indoors when she could have been basking in the light. This woman is lovely. She shared stories about living in the gold country and the treasures yet to be found and her partner (whose name I'm not remembering) and how they open their doors and give free tours of their studios (by appointment, of course). It sounded wonderful and in my mind's eye I entertained getting one of those tours one day.

After lunch we gave the ribbon rose a go. Wow! These beauties are gorgeous. Sandra made them look easy making one in less than three minutes. It took me ten to make the first one and ten to make the second one. Thankfully, wire ribbon is pretty forgiving and on the third attempt I did it in five minutes. Being very pretty, I shall revisit these roses time and time again, I am certain of it.

I will be using Sandra's rose vine layout and a handwritten verse of remembrance but my design and words will be my own. My new digs have a wee hallway which I have decorated in hearts. I call it the 'Hall of Hearts'. I see this new creation showcased

there, maybe called 'Where Love Grows'. Another superb workshop, another friend made. What a wonderful way to start the New Year. Thank you ever sew much, good people.
