Doll Quilts	For little girls & boys. We collect them throughout the year and do- nate during the holidays.

Our stalwart Membership Committee plays a key role in assuring that first time guests are welcomed with a smile and a bit of direction to alleviate being overwhelmed by all the enthusiasm generated at our meetings.

Jan Westerman is Chair of the Membership Committee. She is grateful for her committee members, Rhonda Denny and Jan Andrews; they always have fun feeding off each other during the meetings and the synergy between them creates a real team.

Jan is also the Sunshine Committee, a fitting description of her personality. For the past 4 years, she has been responsible for sending out expressions of compassion and concern to guild members who are facing stressful life situations. More than that, she always meets friends and strangers alike with a cheerful greeting and the desire to make people feel confident that they are welcome and where they are supposed to be.

Until 6 years ago, Jan was a life-long resident of Spokane, Washington. An avid gardener, Jan welcomed the chance to leave the soggy Northwest for our little corner of paradise. Soon after her family made the move, she happened by a quilt show in Windsor and met Pam McVey. Pam told her about the guild and encouraged her to come to one of the meetings. Coincidentally, Jan's first move was into the Acacia apartments right across the street from where we meet, so she walked across Hwy. 12 at her first opportunity and has been actively involved ever since.

A quilter for fifteen years, Jan has been a sewer for most of her life. She fondly remembers her mother who could sew anything from wedding dresses to drapes; she also sewed all of Jan's clothes until she became a teenager ... then Jan was on her own. Her mom would buy the fabric, but Jan had to do the sewing. She was always a bit envious of her brothers who could just go to a store and buy their clothes.

Jan's first quilt was a "quilt-as-you-go" Log Cabin for which she made matching curtains, and a bed skirt. Not comprehending at the time her future passion for quilting, she let it go at a garage sale. She has

since expanded her repertoire to include crochet, knitting looms, counted cross stitch and embroidery. Not one to sit in front of the TV and veg, Jan really enjoys hand work. You will often find her at guild meetings working on her hexie project, always keeping her hands busy.

While she is drawn to shades of blue from aqua to indigo, Jan is also a big fan of bright colored florals and batiks. She has a large collection of fabrics she likes but has "no clue what to do with," so she often turns them into projects for another of her passions ... Community Quilts. She realizes that she bought the mystery fabric to make someone else happy.

The characteristics she most admires about the guild are the unity shared by such a large group of diverse people, the education opportuoffered nities through individuals and workshops, and. above all, the great work that benefits SO



many disadvantaged folks in the community.

UFO's? Too many to count. Jan's active imagination is always planning something new, and it's better to get something started and in the queue while the inspiration is hot. She has fabric stashed in many places and sometimes it's a nice surprise to come across projects she had forgotten about. She knows this will give her lots to work on when she decides to revisit them. Besides the hexie project, she is also working on a red, white and blue Dresden Plate table runner and this year's UFO challenge.

The project that brings her the fondest memories is a quilt she made at her father's request from his plaid shirts and the grandkids' painted sweatshirts. "You know you're doing something right when your parent asks you for a special project." The quilt also includes pieces of a sweatshirt that her mother hand painted. She put a lot of love into that quilt and is pleased that her brother now treasures it.

Sunshine is our Jan Westerman. We are so very fortunate that Jan has chosen the Santa Rosa Quilt Guild to receive her talents, compassion and dedication.

Santa Rosa Quilt Guild Programs and Workshops team booked Jennifer Rapacki for a technology class featuring computer programs 'Photo Shop Elements' and 'Electric Quilt' (EQ). I arrived at the Luther Burbank Art and Garden Center (2050 Yulupa Avenue) about 10 minutes after 8 to find that my handmaiden, Phyllis, has hit the ground running arriving at 8 am sharp with workshop set-up team Jan A. and Jim J. The tables were placed in five rows seating up to five students each. It was more like a classroom than our normal workshop set-up. The projector screen over the stage reflected photographs Jennifer has taken of her journeys. While we set up, we enjoy the show.

The room begins to fill with students. Laptops are plugged in and required downloads are engaged. Jeanie P. made chocolate chip cookies for us breakfast is good. Sharon, our Librarian, makes the scene! It is her first workshop in many, many moons and we are excited to have her with us. Besides, she brought candy. There are some new faces: Beverly, Vera, Marilyn, Robin, and Susan. Donna even takes two days off from work to attend! Once Eva arrives announcements are made, all are accounted for and Jennifer begins the class - right on time.

Jennifer's handouts are comprehensive with excellent photographs. She takes the class bullet-bybullet, line-by-line through the terminology and then we get to 'Pixelate That!' (I don't know how to explain it. You have to go to the class.) The first half of the workshop flies by. We break for a 30-minute lunch and then begin the second half of the day with 'Electric Quilt.'

Moonlight Quilters Wine Country Quilts

Yeah! We have nearly 300 quilts for this year's Quilt Show. Thank you to those that are submitting quilts. Please keep in mind the following dates and actions:

- 1. Last day to "pull" your quilt is May 4th. Be realistic with yourself with those unfinished quilts. Can you get the quilting, binding or whatever needs doing to be done in 4 weeks? If not please pull your quilt.
- 2. Drop off date is Thursday June 4th between 6:00 pm and 7:00 pm.
- 3. All quilts must have a 3"- 5 " wide hanging sleeve. Quilts longer than 90 inches must have a sleeve at 86 inches so the quilt will not drag on the ground. Sleeves can be sewn or safety pinned on.
- 4. All entries must have a quilt show label attached to the lower right corner of the back of the quilt. Labels can be printed out from the MQSC website. Paper entries also had a label on the back of the form.
- 5. Quilt pick up is Sunday June 7th 5 6 pm.
- If you are dropping off or picking up an entry for someone else, you need to provide a permission slip from the owner.

At each venue we will introduce *Cosmic Universe*!

The pattern for this beautiful quilt was created by Melody Crust, of Kent, Washington and displayed in the November 2002 *Quilters Newsletter Magazine*. Permission was kindly granted by Ms. Crust for the Santa Rosa Quilt Guild to make its opportunity quilt using her design.

Santa Rosa Quilt Guild members Kathy Rathbun, Lorna Fiori, Vivian Valencia and Elizabeth McDonnell made the quilt, pulling fabric from their stashes. They also visited local stores to add to the variety of batiks utilized. The circles in the quilt were machine pieced and then hand appliquéd. The quilt measures 64 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 74 $\frac{1}{2}$ " and was made with a black polyester batting.

Gery Rosemurgy, owner of Broadway Quilts in Sonoma, generously donated the backing fabric. Betty Upchurch of the Santa Rosa Quilt Guild machine quilted *Cosmic Universe* and fittingly named it. The response from our own guild has been very positive. I have heard comments like, "It's out of this world," "The colors are so complimentary," "It belongs in a Sci-Fi convention!" I do hope everyone enjoys our journey this year with this quilt, it is an eye catcher and will truly benefit our guild with its numerous ticket sales.
