"The quilt tells a story and the story is our past."

I found this quote in a 45 year old edition of *Quilter's Newsletter*. It may still be true, but I suggest that in the 21st century, we can say "the quilt tells a story and the story is our *present*."

Before the age of Olfa Cutters, self-healing cutting mats and sewing machines with hundreds of decorative stitches, the craft of quilting was pretty much limited to the imaginative recycling of old material, cutting around cardboard templates with scissors, and making do with whatever was available – patchwork rooted in preserved fabric that evoked fond memories.

How fortunate we are today to have all the new technology and tools that make quilting more accessible and productive. We have endless resources for new fabrics. Thousands of books, magazines and DVD's (thanks to Sharon Fry, most can be found in our library) are available to expand our vision. There are hundreds of inspired classes that we can take in person (like our incredible workshops) or on-line. Today's sewing machines almost do the sewing for us, and we even have machines that cut our patches for us.

Our quilting journey no longer needs to focus on the past. Today's quilter is limited only by imagination, experience, and pocket book. The myriad of fabric patterns and colors brings out the artist in all of us. We no longer are limited to maintaining memories from the past, but can express what is going on for us right now ... in the *present*.

February brings us Valentine's Day – a special time to express our love to those who are so important to us. We quilters do not limit that expression of love only to people we know. Thanks to Jan Westerman for organizing our Quilt Fest last month that completed 50 quilts and many pillow cases to distribute to the folks who lost everything in the Valley fire. As with all of our Community Quilt projects, the Quilt Fest was a perfect manifestation of love without expectations – providing warmth and a small sense of security to complete strangers.

March 2016

Ann Shaw is a talented quiltmaker and teacher from

Camas, Washington, specializing in pieced art quilts based on the methods developed by Ruth McDowell. Ruth has retired and Ann continues to teach her methods and expand on her



work. Ann's pictorial quilts are vibrant and playful. She has taught all over the country and has been featured in several books and magazines. Her art quilts are all pieced (not appliqued) and she honors traditional piecing and quilting techniques in her quilts. She develops a pieceable design working from photographs. Many of her subjects are related to the beauty in fauna and flora of the Northwest.

<u>March 17 Program</u> Ann will discuss "Line, Shape and Design" and show how these principles are used in designing quilts.

March 18 Workshop will be "Flowers of the Gorge" in which participants will be able to choose one of 5 designs to make in the class. Using her patterns in the workshop, students will learn the method they can use to develop their own patterns. Kim Fauth

April 2016

Kim Schrader Fauth has been teaching quilt classes for approximately ten years but has been quilting for

over thirty years. A former math teacher, she is an expert at explaining material so it makes sense. When she came up with the new ABCD Technique, she shared it with her Monday quilting group. They strongly encouraged her to write a book because the technique was so new and different.



Her teaching background is evident throughout her book. The directions are in white, gray and black with areas of emphasis in blue. Each step is broken down with accurate drawings and hints to make sewing easier. Even though there are only three steps, she has a review page after Step Two so you don't ruin all your gorgeous fabric! (Yes, we have all done those patterns with six steps to discover at step five something isn't right....) You also will see her fun personality throughout the pages and when she is teaching.

Kim is a native of Illinois but has lived in Colorado, Idaho and Arizona.



This is the first quilt ever made using the ABCD Technique.


The book uses three fabrics cut into any size squares. The ABCD Blocks system takes three hours to make all 32 blocks. Yes, you read that correctly. The directions are in white, gray and black to show value. There is NO set pattern

so you can use the ABCD Blocks to make a variety of items such as table runners, bed quilts, purses, tree skirts, clothing, etc.

April 21 Program Kim will present a trunk show, "ABCD Quilting Magic: How to Make the Blocks and Design." The blocks look complicated because they have parallelograms and trapezoids in addition to triangles.

<u>April 22 Workshop</u> Kim will present "ABCD Quilting - 32 Blocks in 3 hours." Please visit her website to see samples of the possible quilts; especially under the "students" heading.




Block of the Month

Modern fabrics are bold in color and print with high contrast. Modern blocks are updated classic quilt patterns. The designs are minimalist with large areas of negative space.

Write your name on the seam allowance or pin your name to your block. Block is complete and will measure 9"x 9" unfinished and 8 ½" x 8 ½" finished.

All blocks for the 2016 BOM modern sampler will measure 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". Make one for Block of the Month and one for yourself if you would like to have a modern sampler at the end of the year.

| 40" x 60" | Lap quilts for adults. Given to Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, deserving seniors in local convalescent hospitals, & others. |
| Doll Quilts | For little girls & boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays. |

Remembering Dorothy Lucas

Dorothy Lucas

December 1919 – April 2015

Although she was not a founding member of SRQG, Dorothy joined in the second year of its existence, when there were less than twenty members. She came to the Guild (as most early members did) after being in Joyce Gross' quilting class through Santa Rosa Junior College.

Scores, if not hundreds, of women (at least two of whom are current members of SRQG) owe their sewing expertise to Dorothy's patient and attentive teaching during her years at Herbert Slater Junior High (as it was then called).

Dorothy was a very active member of SRQG, even enlisting the help of her husband "Luke" to do the hanging of quilts in SRQG's first "National Quilt Contest and Festival of Quilts," held at the Sonoma County Fairgrounds in May of 1978.

Dorothy was known for her precise detail work, particularly applique and embroidery, all of which, as well as her quilting, was done by hand. Machine work (except for piecing) just "wasn't done" in those times. Examples of her work can be seen in one of the blocks of Dotty Zagar's "Butterfly" quilt as well as "The Quilt of Roses" from 1980 and Vernice Thorn's "Rose Quilt" of 1983.

Dorothy was active to the very end and has left this world a bit better for her sojourn here.

Technique Sharing Workshops

On February 18th Vicki David will demonstrate a TSW (Technique Sharing Workshop) entitled "Treasures from an Old Tin Trunk." Last year, Vicki shared her wall quilt at "Show and Tell" and there was great interest in her project.

This is a small wall hanging quilt designed to hold all of those pins, buttons, and other small sentimental items we all have. The original pattern was called "Treasures from an Old Tin Trunk." It measures 40.5 inches by 30.5 inches, but you can make it as small or as large as you would like. Hers was made from scraps...the only yardage would be for the borders and the centers of the squares, if you would like them to be the same fabric.

The pattern is made up of squares and rectangles constructed like a log cabin block. You can change the number of squares and rectangles you want to sew based on the items you will be pinning onto the quilt. Two squares will equal the size of one triangle.

The instructions and paper-pieced patterns are on the TSW website to print out. She will be sewing these blocks with the paper-pieced method at the TSW workshop. You do not need to bring fabric or your machines. She will just demonstrate the techniques that she uses to assemble the blocks. The instructions, paper-pieced patterns, and your notes will get you on your way to make your own wall hanging at home!

QUILTATHON!

This Thursday, February 4th, is our first Quiltathon of the year. Please join your fellow guild members as we finish quilts for children at Valley of the Moon, babies in the NICUs at Memorial and Sutter Hospitals, and other deserving community members.

Laura Barrett and Nancy Stedman will oversee the day and need people to do all sorts of quilting tasks. Please bring your machine to sew layered quilts or to quilt the VOM or baby quilts. Remember to bring a pillow to sit on, walking foot, free motion foot, and a neutral thread. If you like to do hand sewing, bring your own little sewing kit, complete with thimble, small sharp scissors, and needles. We will also have some standing jobs - ironing, pinning the layered quilts (no special tools needed), and trimming and turning the layered and sewn quilts (bring a large pair of sharp scissors).

Doors open at 9:00 am, and you can sew from 9:00 to 10:00 when we'll break for a short business meeting. Then back to sewing and visiting with friends until about 2:30 pm. At noon our wonderful hospitality crew will serve several delicious soups to accompany salads and desserts brought by members. We look forward to spending the day with you and to putting all of your generosity and creativity to work.

Our guild has a long history of giving generously to those in need of warmth and comfort. Our Community Quilts program began in 1984, and as of the end of 2015 we had donated a total of 19,958 guilts to deserving members of our community. You are an awesome group!

A couple of hours into the day, my husband texted me asking how the cat herding was going. I was pleased to reply that I was working with 'pro quilters.' Most of you knew exactly what you were going to do and went about doing it. Some came to help in what ever manner possible. Everyone was thanking me for a job well done, but I was merely the Captain and the rest of you the hard working crew. You all deserve my praise and applause.

Accomplishments since Quilt Fest:

- 21 finished quilts were turned in with SRQG labels sewn on (We are well above the 30 quilts I had originally committed us to)
- 106 amazing pillowcases
- · 2 hand knitted dish cloths
- 13 potholders

I want to reiterate my thanks to Norma Viglienzone for volunteering to make her minestrone soup and organize the lunch crew. Bonus food was a nice surprise too. Thanks to Sharon 'The Librarian' Fry for arriving so early for set up and making the Library plus limited Silent Auction items available.
