She will be showing many of her beautiful quilts and talking about "What if I..." showing how to play with different components of patterns to get very different results.



work as a textile artist and designer. A few years back, Rob landed a job in his mother's quilt shop "The Cotton Ball" in Morro Bay, California. It was at The Cotton Ball where Rob found a fondness for Hawaiian shirt making. Shirt scraps make beautiful quilts and so does Rob. He learned to quilt by trial and error, and definitely brings a masculine touch to this age old tradition. Rob's quilts are

100% machine made and focus on applique work.

Now, after almost twenty years in the industry, Rob designs quilts for Michael Miller Fabrics, has authored a few books, countless quilt patterns including The Endangered Species Quilt Project, produced a few DVDs on his techniques, and is inventing sewing and quilting tools. He services sewing machines in his studio in Morro Bay, California.

He is blessed to travel the world sharing his experiences and joy in quiltmaking and sewing machine technology.

His trunk show will be entertaining and lively as he takes us through his own development as a quilter and some of his beautiful quilts.

March 17: Program: Ann will discuss "Line, Shape and Design" and show how these principles are used in designing quilts.

March 18: Workshop will be "Flowers of the Gorge" in which participants will be able to choose one of 5 designs to make in the class. Using her patterns in the workshop, students will learn the method they can use to develop their own patterns. 


Block of the Month

The theme for the block of the month for the year 2016 is **Modern**. This is an exciting trend in the quilt world right now. It came from the modern design movement. In the quilt world it is an updating of classic quilt patterns. The designs are minimalist with large areas of negative space. Colors are bold. Neutrals in modern blocks are white, off-white and shades of gray. The blocks are high contrast. The great thing about modern blocks is they are easy to sew. If you make two blocks each month at the end of the year you will have a modern sampler. I hope you join us in 2016 for the Modern Block of the Month.

Mark your calendars and plan to join us for a fun day of visiting and working together on quilts for our community. In late January look for an email with more details.


If you would like to work on donation quilts at home, please refer to the following size chart..

COMMUNITY QUILT SIZES

If you are making donation quilts on your own, these are the approximate sizes most needed.

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter & Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, & teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fabrics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other Organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults. Given to Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, deserving seniors in local convalescent hospitals, & others.
Doll Quilts	For little girls & boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.

These workshops, led or taught by our own members on a volunteer basis, give our members a chance to share, learn and practice various special techniques related to quilting.

Please sign up for these demonstrations in advance, so that we may be sure to have the correct number of handouts, and plan for an appropriate space. The Home Page Calendar includes the 2016 Technique Sharing Workshops.

TSW Handouts are archived on the blog, effective with the 2011 TSWs.

Diana Roberts will lead the TSW at our first meeting of the year on January 7. It is called "How to find the perfect 1/4 inch on your sewing machine"

Have you ever wondered why your blocks don't turn out the right size? Don't trust your '4" foot or your eyeball? Diana will do a demonstration on finding the perfect '4' on any sewing machine.

This is recommended for people who want to participate in Block of the Month for 2016.

Sign ups will be in the back of the room for the demonstration. Please sign up before the meeting on the 7th so that we know how many people plan to attend the demonstration. This will help us to be ready with appropriate number of chairs after lunch.

Sew A Row



Arriving at 8:15, the Luther Burbank Art and Garden Center was already bursting with activity - Gari and Phyllis were readying the room. The tables were covered in shower caps of plastic and elastic shared with us by the Pointless Sisters. (Thank you, Elindale and Sisters for the kindness.) At each seat. Vicki and her assistant, Jeanie, had placed kits containing plates of plastic and Styrofoam, a cosmetic sponge, a block for printing, flexible printing plates, template material, and half a dozen other wonderful things. The two forward tables – those used by teachers - were covered in every manner of paint, crayons, tools, templates - anything and everything we might need. In terms of a kit it was the most comprehensive kit I have even seen dispensed at a workshop. The lot of us used every bit of the supplies.

Vicki's handouts are fabulous, her bibliography is impressive, and her body of work is timeless. Vicki gave excellent demonstrations about every 30 minutes. We began by selecting two colors of paint, one at a time. In my case, I began with white silk fabric and pink paint followed by a not quite yellow mustard color. Once the fabric was covered in paint, Jeanie put the plates - each containing a wet wad of painted fabric - into a microwave for three minutes and then into the sun to dry. We went on to the next project, which involved the cosmetic sponges followed by paintbrushes, toothbrushes, denture brushes - "pick a brush, any brush" techniques. 
