

Most of the time, we never know who receives our donations. We don't meet the kids at Valley of the Moon Children's Center: we can't visit the


babies in the Neonatal Intensive Care Units; we can't connect with the elderly woman who has to share a room with three others in

Marcia fell in love with quilting 15 years ago as a means of staving off insanity during the long, dark Alaska winters. She found that colorful fabric combined with colorful friendships is, indeed, the perfect solution for surviving the snowy, monochromatic season. Marcia enjoys teaching



on a regular basis and editing quilt books for Brenda Henning of Bear Paw Productions. She began publishing her own patterns in 2008. "Landscapes"

Laura has been a mural painter and seamstress for many years, and has recently begun to combine the two media and go in a whole new direction — art quilting. She uses a "painterly" collage style in her art, with landscapes as her primary focus. Much of her inspira-



tion comes from the beauty she enjoys on a daily basis in Mendocino County.

Laura's work has been shown both locally and nationally. Many pieces have been juried into major shows, and a number have been prizewinners. Her work has been published in calendars, magazines, and books. She lectures and teaches art quilting classes throughout Northern California. For the last 30 years, Laura has been teaching blind people how to get around with a white cane. Maybe it is this all-day focus on lack of sight that makes the world such a visual treat for her. Everything in her landscapes is cut freehand and allowed to move around as she machine appliqués pieces onto the layers below. She works fast as a means of achieving a more dynamic outcome.

June 16 Workshop

"Quilted Landscape Collage"

Laura Fogg's workshop on Friday, June 16, 2017 will

help you discover the "artist within" as you play with the fabrics of your choice to create a small (2' by 3') landscape collage wall quilt. Expect this to be a fun, creative, interactive and successful experience. Each student will start with a photo of a place that inspires them (possibly a sce-



ne from Emandal) and create a freehand collage quilt which can be sewn together in or out of class by hand or with a sewing machine. There are no patterns or rules in this class...it's a chance to play and explore your unique artistic eye with the support of both the instructor and your classmates. Her workshop is designed for all levels of quilters!

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter & Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, & teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fabrics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other Organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults. Given to Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convalescent hospitals, & others.
Doll Quilts	For little girls & boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.

It has been a fabulous month for the Boutique and Raffle. April 6th winners of the raffle were: Jan Robinson, Carole Behlke, Mary Ann Hayre, Jim Jensen, and Joanne LeBaudour--congratulations to the winners. The raffle netted \$128 for the day. The Healdsburg Quilt Show was a fabulous success. Everyone agreed that it was the best of the six years. There were more quilts, and they were the most colorful yet. The show just gets better and better. The director is already looking forward to next year. Several employees commented that this is their favorite event of the whole year. Now for the record: the Guild received \$175.00 just for participating; \$65.00 for second place for the most colorful display, the Boutique had \$339.00 in sales, (mostly thread catchers) and the Opportunity Quilt netted \$239.00. A grand total of \$818.00 was made for our Guild treasury.

All in all it was a great weekend for all participants and the Guilds. My heartfelt thanks to all the ladies who helped out with the hanging of the quilts, working the Boutique and selling tickets for the Opportunity Quilt, and even more so for the ones who helped take the quilts down, clean up, and load my car. They were a Godsend as I was too sore to move much for the next two days. On Friday before the show and again on Saturday there were a couple of medical emergencies causing changes in some of the plans. It worked to the advantage of the Guilds participating as not as many individual prizes were given out. But, all the money collected for the day was distributed to the guilds displaying their quilts. Everyone went home with some money.

The April 20, 2017 raffle netted \$142.00, and Chris Nolen is doing a fantastic job of getting everyone to purchase raffle tickets. (Remember, if everyone attending purchases just one dollar in tickets we would net over \$100 per meeting to help pay the rent for our meetings.) The winners were: Metha Schuler, Debbie Cole, Toni Anderson, Blanche Mansoor and Judy Dieter. It was a great day for everyone as we had a very entertaining and enlightening speaker for our program.



Technique Sharing Workshops

These workshops are offered free each month to our members. We all have skills and tricks to share and sometimes new ideas we bring from workshops or quilt shows. Here are some details from the next couple of TSWs.

PHYLLIS GALLAWAY - "STUDIO 180® RULERS" May 18, 2017

Phyllis will demonstrate how to use several of these rulers which she discovered at the Houston Quilt Show. If you have ever wanted to make flying geese, square in a square, any of three types of triangles in a square, quarter square triangles, hourglass units, or split rectangles, these rulers make it so easy to be accurate. They have markings showing you what to cut, where to sew, and how to trim for the perfect units. Each ruler accommodates multiple sizes of units.



TONI ANDERSON, CATHY RAPP, VICKI DAVID AND JANICE RODGERS - "QUILT LABELS" June 15, 2017

Our talented panel will show you how to make computer printed labels, put pictures on your labels or write the story of the quilt. You can iron them on, sew them on or make embroidered labels. Lots of ways to do them, so make sure all your quilts get a name and a label. If you get stuck on how to do labels...be sure and come to this workshop.

Diane Steele Workshop

Diane Steele is a lovely woman, a fabulous speaker, and a wonderful teacher. Her lecture, 'Group Quilts', was entertaining and inspiring. Her trunk show of group quilts was chock-full. The ideas for these projects were whimsical and fun and the finished quilts, amazing. If you missed the Program, get thee to the SRQG.org website and see her wonderful quilts... and be inspired. She describes herself as a rabid quilter. Being one myself, I agree.

The workshop 'Charming Silhouettes' held at Village Sewing Center was a treat. She brought many silhouettes we could trace using light boxes onto Heat and Bond, a rubbery fusible that keeps raw edges of appliqués from fraying, which makes for cleaner silhouettes. For those of us who love to fuse, I find Heat and Bond the best fusible. However, it's rather stiff so it is not for a quilt to be wrapped in.

The first part of the workshop was about making the scrappy body of the quilt from a 5" square charm pack. She had us cut some of the 5" squares ever so slightly off center to create checkerboards and otherwise add interest to the background, upon which a silhouette would sit. I am in a phase of neutral so I made my own charms in golds, silvers (using ironing board covering as a fabric), beiges, browns and blacks. Love it! (Word to the wise, black is not a good choice as it could interfere with the placement of the black silhouette...) Many of us completed the charming scrappy portion of the quilt. Many of us were so inspired that the quilts grew in size well into the afternoon. You must know that I love, love, LOVE my quilt and can't wait to bring it in for show and tell.

Diane is an excellent instructor. She was completely devoted to each and every one of us. She even cut some fabric strips for me (I have leverage issues). She is kind and gracious, informative and helpful. She started a challenge with a group of five or six of the students that will culminate with a party in December! (If I didn't have one hundred thousand things on my "to do" list, I would have knocked someone over to play with the girls.)

I want to say something about the Village Sewing Center. I love workshops that are held at fabric stores. If you need something - fabric, thread, needles, fusibles – it's probably in the room. The teaching space is already set up; irons, ironing boards, extension cords, and chairs, cutting mats, and tables - everything is there and ready to be used. The only thing you need to schlep is your own sewing accoutrements. If needed, there is a technician, in this
