President's Message


So how are you coming along with your New Year's resolutions? You might recall I wrote about my resolutions in the January issue of *Stitch'n Times*:

"Embroidery Changes Through the Decades"

Robin Kingsley from Bird Brain Designs in Kelseyville will talk about how she got started doing embroidery in the early 1960s. From there she will share how embroidery has changed throughout the decades and what relaxation stitching can bring to you! In addition, you will have the opportunity to realize how you can incorporate embroidery into your quilts to embellish, finish seams, add character to make them even more special!

March 17 Workshop "Embroidery Loves Patchwork"

Participants will embroider the center of a Tinv Treasure Tote with additional decorative embroidery on the Patchwork Tote. You will learn embroidery techniques that will add texture and interest to your quilt. Each participant will be asked to purchase the tote kit which includes all supplies for completing the embroidery except for a pair of scissors and a



thimble. Kit fee is \$14.00. This 9" x 7" tote can be

Hello Santa Rosa Quilt Guild! Your Programs and Workshops Chair, Janice Rodgers and committee have provided us with another wonderful teacher and workshop. Tracey's pattern and teaching abilities have put forth a rare occurrence in that this is one of the very few times that all of the blocks were constructed during the workshop. The pattern for Sankaku, Japanese for triangle, is quick, gorgeous, and easy if one pays attention. This is one time when the love I have for the piece is unwavering.

The workshop opened with announcements regarding kitchen and restroom facilities, silencing one's camera phone, when there would be a break for a 30 minute lunch, and soliciting helpers to clean up after the class. Then Tracey took over with her announcements and expectations. The woman did not sit down (except to eat) the entire day. She made the rounds many times giving us the personal attention, praises, tips, and suggestions required to help us flourish. Half-square triangles are wonderful things. You get two from each square causing productivity to double. With a guarter-inch seam and a fancy ruler that is practically magic, a **Block Loc**®, the half-square triangles are precision pieces making for a squared quilt. Once one decides if the dark side of the triangle is up or down the drama appears and it is lovely.

Workshops are intended to be self-supporting, meaning the \$40.00 dollar cost times 20 people pays for teachers. For those of you that don't know, \$40.00 dollars for a six and a half hour workshop featuring premier teachers is a steal of a deal. To take the same caliber of workshop from a fabric store could cost two to three times as much. To have access to these phenomenal classes, one must be an SRQG member. To be a member a mere 35 bones for one year's dues is incredible. Personally, I think it is the best money I've ever spent...
