President's Message

Our little corner of the world changed drastically six months ago; some for the worse, some for the better. For many of us, memories of living through the week of smoke and fear have become softer. So much has returned to "normal." For a precious group of our friends, the reality is much harder to push to the side, and "normal" has been redefined. We continue to hold the "Cinder Sisters" very close to our hearts.

The outreach by the world's quilting community has been truly inspirational. Many of you know the story, but this is my understanding of how we became beneficiaries of the generosity of quilters who wanted make a difference. I read that someone who had been a speaker at our guild was teaching in Texas. She spoke to the guild there and mentioned that she had heard about the SRQG members who had lost their homes and the guild losing all of our stash for community quilts in the fire. A quilter at that meeting came up with the idea of promoting a "fat quarter drive" for SRQG so that we could replenish our stash.

From there, the fat quarter idea was posted on the "Quilt Along with Pat Sloan" Facebook page. The post went viral. My first knowledge of this effort happened after the flow of boxes started coming into our post office box, which was after our October board meeting. On the "contact us" page of our website, there is a box where one can send a message to the president. In the 21 months prior to the fire, I may have received five messages. Suddenly I was getting 10 to 15 messages a day – people writing that they saw the post on Pat Sloan and wondering how they could help. Other people writing they saw the post on a Moda blog, another blog in Washington, and several other sources. There were so many connections made, we'll never know all the players in this production. We did not want to squelch anyone's desire to express their support, but by the second week it was obvious that we would be inundated. I posted a request on our website to not send us any more donations. I replied to everyone who wrote to the website that they should redirect their donations locally. However, the dam had been breached and there was no way to stop the flow.

Our first task was to figure out where we were going to store all these boxes until we could work with them. Surely this will go on for a week or two and it will be done. Linda Hooper and I suffer from the same malady of having a spring-actuated arm, and she volunteered the new storage shed her husband, Ron, had just recently finished building. Little did we realize that the flow of boxes would not stop until March. For several weeks, I would visit the post office daily and fill my car, sometimes having to leave boxes there because my car wasn't big enough to pack them all. Many boxes were being delivered directly to Linda's house as well. By the time the tide receded, the storage shed was about 50% filled with boxes – about 8' high by 15' wide by 6' deep. That comes out to 720 cubic feet, or almost 30 cubic yards of fabric, which is enough to fill 30 pickup trucks. The storage shed started showing a definite tilt. Starting in January, Linda and I, with the help of Jan Andrews, Alana Coburn, Vicki David, and Toni Anderson, met about once a week to open boxes and sort fabric into bundles. I saved the return addresses on all the packages with the intention of sending out thank you post cards at some point. Many of you have participated in the results of the fabric project, and have graciously purchased fabric bundles at a great value. When the fabric sale is done, hopefully soon, all proceeds from the sale will go to the "Cinder Sisters."

The statistician in me (no, that does not qualify me to be treasurer at some point in the future) was curious to see a breakdown of all the numbers:

J We recorded the addresses from 908 boxes and envelopes. A few folks sent just a fat quarter in a number 10 envelope; many sent us several boxes. Those return addresses don't reflect the number of people who were actually reaching out to us because many were from guilds, and the boxes represented the giving intention of hundreds more people. Postage on these packages came to over \$9,000.

Many quilters included threads, needles, templates, books, and other notions. Several sewing machines were offered or donated for the Cinder Sisters, but at the time, most of the fire survivors had either

replaced their machine or had no room for one. I donated an old Kenmore to Good Will and another one in a cabinet to Village Sewing Center because I had no room to keep them and no one wanted them.

- Donations were sent from at least 80 guilds throughout the country.
- Donations were received from 49 of the 50 states in the union.
- Donations were received from Australia, Canada, England, Germany, Mexico, and Scotland.

California provided 25% of the number of donations, followed by Washington, Texas, Florida, and Arizona. We even received several donations from Ventura right at the time they were experiencing their own devastating fires.

Janet Tonkin received 178 finished quilts and 52 tops; 124 of those quilts have been distributed.

My deep gratitude goes to Ann Nolen, Chris Nolen, and Justine Lott for taking on the task of creating and sending out the "thank you" to all the donors (so much better than my vision of a thank you post card!). As an excellent example of the cohesiveness of our wonderful guild, they set up a spontaneous envelope stuffing party at the end of our April 5th meeting. It was wonderful to see everyone participating. Truly, we are all in this together.

Even our "thank you" letter has been getting response:


Paula Butler from Fort Bragg, CA sums it up. "Quilters are good people!"



2018. Then went to Rhonda Denny with her SoCo

I ironed, fused, measured, and cut 1.5" strips. I sewed them together, end-to-end. I ended up with nearly 700 inches in all of the black and gold. Then I did it again with the reds for another 600 inches. As I admired each beautiful piece of silk I thought about the story that Julie told me: a silk tie company was going out of business and selling the scraps at two dollars a bag. She had picked up one and she split it in half with me.

I thought about the people who had purchased the ties for important meetings, weddings, interviews, dances, baptisms, church, and synagogue. Then I thought about the people who worked at the tie company, now defunct. Did they find new jobs? Were they able to start over? What if they lost their homes? What about the children and the community

suffering due to job As my mind wandered from situation to situation the scrap silk became a kind of symbol to me. I realized that because of the recent fires here in Sonoma County, we have to start over too. Can we stay? something beautiful and meaningful? I say yes because behind every scrap is a person, a story, and memories to build again.

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

Block of the Month

"M is for Majesty" is the name of this month's Block of the Month. The Majesty block incorporates 3 con-

trasting shades of Ultra Violet or Purple, dark, medium and light. Did you know In the traditional color wheel, violet and purple are both placed between red and blue. Purple occupies the space closer to red and violet is closer to blue. Violet is a spectral color: it occupies its own place at



the end of the spectrum of light first identified by Isaac Newton in 1672, and has its own wavelength; whereas, purple is a combination of two spectral colors, red and blue.

The color purple is mainly used to represent royalty and luxury. It can also represent more spiritual ideas such as imagination, spiritual fulfillment and a balance between one's physical and spiritual soul.

Rolled all into one, the Majesty block expresses our own inner beauty. Let your imagination be the guide selecting the dark, medium and light colors for the block. Enjoy!

The directions are on our website: www.santarosaquiltguild.org/block.php.

The Majesty block measures 9 ½" unfinished and involves sewing 3 long strips together to be cut into 4 - 5" sections. Sew one or as many as you like to increase your winning chances.

*Special Note for New Members: Join in the fun of sewing a BOM. A new BOM is introduced at the first meeting of each month. You can increase your chances of winning by sewing several blocks because for every block turned in, you receive a raffle ticket. At the first meeting of the following month, a drawing takes place for a Guild members to win the blocks that have been completed that month.

Our next Quiltathon is Thursday, May 3rd from 9:00 to 2:30 at our usual meeting place. At 10:00 we will break for a short business meeting. The rest of the day will be spent sewing and visiting. The dedicated kitchen crew will provide PIZZA. If your birthday is in May or November please bring some salad or dessert to share.

If you can, bring your sewing machine to do quilting. Don't forget to bring your walking foot or free motion foot. We will have tables set up for pinning and turning the quilts. If you want to sew on labels be sure to bring your needle, scissors, and thimble. Remember a pillow to sit on!

Thursday, May 31 will be another Fifth Thursday at the Luther Burbank Art and Garden Center. You can work on your own projects or help with community quilts. We will be there from 9-3, so come when you can and stay as long as you wish. Bring your own lunch.

In April, 100 quilts went to the Valley of the Moon home. So far this year 152 quilts have gone to local veterans and 60 NICU quilts have gone to hospitals and Public Health. If you are making quilts and/or tops at home we can use more boy or gender neutral NICU quilts. For Valley of the Moon we need some that appeal to teens, especially boys. Quilts also go to adults of all ages.

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter & Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, & teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fabrics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other Organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults. Given to Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convalescent hospitals, & others.
Doll Quilts	For little girls & boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.


