### President's Message

A year ago life was filled with the promises and pleasures of living in our beloved Sonoma County. After celebrating our 2017 Founders' Day, little could we realize that our lives would be forever changed before our next meeting.

In the August issue of "Stitch'n Times," I wrote:

"The creation of a quilted piece commemorating the devastation that hit our community ten months ago might evoke a wide variety of emotions: sadness, anger, anxiety, or remorse. But such an expression might also bring a sense of healing, resolution, and hope for a bright future. For most of us, life has returned to "normal" (whatever that is) but now with a constant, profound awareness that everything "normal" can change in an instant.

"How have things been for our Cinder Sisters?"

The following is a continuation of the interviews I conducted with some of our friends ...

### What part of the past 10 months do they find the most frustrating? Do they see a resolution in the near future?

"It took a month and a half to get high-speed hook-ups at our rental. Dealing with insurance and trying to learn what we can legitimately ask for continues to be ongoing."

"The most frustrating part has been, continues to be, dealing with insurance. Life will not be settled until all of that is settled."

"The last three months have definitely been the worst for us. Our new home is crawling toward the finish line, and we are very frustrated at the endless delays we have encountered at the hands of our builder."

"Our life is settling down, the insurance claim is almost done so we will be able to start house hunting soon. The waiting has been the most frustrating. It seems that everything depends on something else happening first."

"It was frustrating trying to find a home. We did it and are very happy. Oakmont people are very friendly and I certainly have a lot of quilting friends here."

"We have been very fortunate to get through the relocation process smoothly. The first few months were rough - - while the insurance company was requiring inventory of all possessions lost. But we got past that eventually."

"It's the waiting that is the most frustrating. Waiting to hear from the insurance company, the architects, the builders, the city of Santa Rosa, the county, the Federal government, etc. These are lives we are talking about and all of us would just like to move forward but it takes so darn long, we feel like we are waiting our lives away."

#### How has being a member of SRQG helped them?

"It helped to volunteer at Beth's Quilt Club in Roseland once a week and to help the students with their projects. I feel like I have made additional friends at the guild and have more people stop and check in with me. Several of them have brought me sewing notions to get me started again. In addition, I received a beautiful bed quilt which I will always cherish. The generosity of others can be overwhelming at times but always appreciated."

"I cannot thank the guild enough for the comfort it has provided me. I have been quilting for years and am

a charter member of Diablo Valley Quilt Guild. Attending the guild meetings has really helped to give me something to look forward to. The fact the guild embraced me, gave me a quilt and then the fabric donations that I had access to has been really incredible. I've taken a couple workshops and now my niece has joined the guild too."

"Just how it always does, with tons of emotional support, love, and fabric."

"I love going to meetings and listening to the speakers. It makes me feel more positive and want to move on."

"Being a member of a large family like SRQG was incredibly important for my recovery process. I know that I would never have felt so supported without the constant updates and email communication that flowed to the members every day. I knew for sure that life would return to normal with the love of this incredible group of friends and family."

"Just knowing that we have that support is an amazing feeling. I've never experienced anything like it."

"I think that the Guild was the biggest help to me. The love, warmth and caring from our members was healing, especially immediately following the fire. That first sew day just for us. Someone came up to me with a little bear, one just like one I lost, which was so loving. All of the fabric and tools from across the country and beyond was amazing. The quilts that I received from our members and from other places are really heartwarming. I am usually one who gives and donates and to suddenly be the recipient of such generosity was humbling. A special thank you to all of you who stored, sorted and bundled the fabrics. What an awesome job you all did. The way the Guild distributed everything was beautifully organized and executed. Thank you, again."

### Are they able to get back to quilting, and if so, what are they working on now?

"Yes, but slowly. I have completed one art quilt and am working on the fire challenge quilt."

"I am English Paper Piecing a new Halloween quilt to replace the 'La Passacaglia' which was 2/3 completed, and I've completed several 'I Spy' baby quilts to replace finished quilts and tops that were destroyed in the fire."

"No I haven't been quilting; hopefully I'll get there soon."

"I just did a count and I am working on my 13th quilt since the fires. I am quilting with an urgency that I did not have before the fires. I know it is big therapy

for me. I am so grateful to have an interest like quilting that gives me and others so much joy. The quilt I made for my new home just after the fires is the most favorite quilt I have ever made."

"My friend and I were working on a quilt together. The background burned in the fire, but the applique magnolia blossoms were at her house. We are putting it back together now. We thought of names for it like "Phoenix, Rising from the Ashes," but settled on "Tickled Pink." We are quilting it now."

"Honestly, at first I was intimidated. I've only been quilting a few years and I was finally hitting my stride last fall. After buying a few new things (sewing machine, furniture, supplies), I couldn't even go into my space. It's not the safe space I once created for myself that gave me peace and serenity. Then in April I took a class at Village Sewing, hoping that would jumpstart me, and it did help. But I just finished my first project (a quilt top) and it's ready to quilt. Now I am excited to sew again."

#### How does being a quilter help the healing?

"It helps to have a creative outlet."

"I made a small fish wall hanging gave it to a friend last year. This year I received a gift box with a note that said this belongs to the artist who created it, truly a beautiful gesture. It's now in our new bathroom."

"Something to focus on to get my mind off fire "stuff"."

"Quilting and sewing are my therapy."

#### What's next?

"Having all this in the past for everyone."

"My new house and getting to design my new sewing room. I spend every evening on Pinterest looking for ideas."

"Seeing Sonoma recover!"

"Hopefully building our new forever home ... assuming we can afford it. We're still waiting to find out how much a home, landscaping, etc., will cost. We can't really move on from this space of complete limbo until we do. And we wait another day ... "

And now a year later, our life is once again filled with the promises and pleasures of living in our beloved Sonoma County.

On a personal note, my thanks to all of the members of the Santa Rosa Quilt Guild for bestowing upon me the 2018 Merit Award. I feel very grateful and honored.

Hello Santa Rosa Quilt Guild! We are fast approaching the last workshop of the year, Sue Nickels from Ann Arbor, Michigan, on Thursday, October 18, 2018. Her Program, 'Made by Machine' is on the history of the sewing machine and it's impacts on the home sewer and quilter. This Program will be held at the Scottish Rite Center on the corner of Acacia Lane and Highway 12. Meetings begin at 10:00am. Immediately after welcoming guests and new members, Sue will take the dais. Meetings usually last about two hours, finishing after Show-and-Tell. There is an after-meeting lunch - meant to augment the sandwich one brings with them – that commonly includes salads and sweet yum-yums. Parking is limited so carpool or arrive early.

Sue is highly sought and quite popular. You don't want to miss a minute of her lecture. Then, stay for the after meeting camaraderie and enjoy a world-class library, silent auctions and raffles, and the many committees such as Friendship Block and Community Quilts.

Sue's Workshop, 'Ashley's Flower Basket, Raw Edge Appliqué,' explores a different application of fusible web to keep the appliqué soft and stable for machine sewing. The workshop will be held at The Luther Burbank Art and Garden Center located at 2050 Yulupa Ave., and begins at 9:00am. Early arrival for set-up is required so we can begin on time. There is a 30-minute lunch break. It's best to bring a sack lunch. There are eateries nearby but 30 minutes passes quickly. Workshops run until 3:30 pm at which time there is a 30-minute clean-up. We lock the doors at 4:00 pm. There is a \$40.00 fee for workshops. Make checks payable to SRQG or see me for a cash receipt. In addition, there is an \$8.00 pattern fee paid to the teacher. For

January 17 &18, 2019 Inger Blood Program: "Progression of Free-Motion Quilting" Workshop: "Ruler Quilting"

Inger started at an early age, helping her mother support the family by sewing doll clothes for a near-



by toy factory. From an early age, Inger demonstrated a creative flair and an excellent aptitude for art. Inger's mother Mary was skilled in the "old world" thread arts of knitting and embroidery. Inger went on at an early age to selfteach herself tatting, and crocheting, after mastering knitting and embroidery.

In her spare time, Inger continued to branch out and learn different fiber art/mixed media forms, adding

spinning and dying yarns, silk dying and glass bead work. In the first ten years after moving to El Dorado County, Inger completed numerous embroidery and home spun knitted pro-



jects which she successfully competed and won critical acclaim.

In 1997 Inger narrowed her creative focus and immersed herself primarily in patchwork and quilting. Inger managed to create and produce many beautiful and award winning quilts.

Having nearly shunned most other fiber art forms, Inger is singularly passionate about quilting. Inger continues to produce original quilt art pieces which have been Juried in, won, and displayed at Regional and National quilt shows.

### Program:

This is a Trunk Show with over 40 quilts and garments demonstrating Inger's progression from beginner to expert. The show will include quilts and gar-

ments that have won awards at PIQF, Road to California, AQS and HMQS shows as well as the California State Fair and the EI Dorado County Fair. Inger will show machine work from her early days 50 years ago. Topics of discussion will include the vast improvement of using a well tuned machine with the correct needle, thread, and tension. Additionally, the techniques and advantages of finish blocking will be discussed.

### Workshop:

An accomplished quilter, Inger, will teach this class, demonstrating all necessary steps of the process.

- Hands-on instruction for using rulers.
- Learn how to lay out a grid to complete your design.
- A variety of designs will be discussed, including crosshatching and curved crosshatching using straight and circular rulers.
- All on your domestic sewing machine!



But especially for this Organic block, the block is sewn as a 9-patch of 9 different contrasting colors, **the brighter the better**, prints and/or sol-



ids, incorporating a splash of Ultra Violet or a shade of purple. It's what you then do with the sewn 9patch block that makes it 'Organic'.



### Awards

Over the past 42 years as our Santa Rosa Quilt Guild membership has grown from the original eleven Founding Members to now approximately 300, we continue to strive to learn the new quilting techniques and styles as they arise, as well as addressing the needs in our community.

At our Founders' Day celebration, the third Thursday of each September, we have the opportunity to recognize members who have gone above and beyond the call of duty. The October fires brought new challenges to all of us. When social media advertised that we could use some help, no one anticipated that over 908 envelopes and packages of fabrics, notions, guilts, and guilt tops would pour into our post office box that soon became a room. It was estimated that over 30 pickup trucks worth of love arrived on our doorstep, and a plan was put into action. Jim Jensen, Linda Hooper, Toni Anderson, Jan Andrews, Vicki David, and Alana Colburn met more times that anyone can remember to sort through and figure out the best uses for the treasures that came our way. Items were organized, and countless bins were filled and schlepped to meetings to share with members in various ways. For going above and beyond the call of duty, our guild thanks these dedicated workers with Merit Awards. Each of these members is offered their choice of having next year's dues paid, an engraved charm, or a certificate to attend a workshop of their choice.

The status of Honorary Life Member (HLM) is given to a member for continued outstanding service to our guild. To qualify, the person must be a member for at least five years, served at least one elected position, and/or an additional board position or a performed as a committee chair. The special recognition is only awarded when there is a qualifier, and not necessarily each year, and one and only one HLM may be given in a year. We were very happy to acknowledge JANICE RODGERS as our 21<sup>st</sup> HLM on September 20, 2018.

Upon joining our guild Janice immediately jumped in as our Parliamentarian for two years in 2006 and 2007. She has served as Chair of our Technique Sharing Workshops (TSWs) and Co-Chair of a Challenge when she and Diana Roberts inspired (and taught) us to create fish projects. She has stepped up to be our Program Chair-Elect/Program Chair in 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2016, 2017, 2018, and now 2019. She has not only sought out interesting world -class speakers to entertain and instruct our members, but has opened her home to countless people who have praised her hostessing abilities. Her or-
