President's Message

April 4th is a very special day – it is the unveiling of our new 2020 Opportunity Quilt and saying goodbye to the quilt Lori Platt and I pieced, and Marian Drain brought to life with her spectacular quilting.

"Our Town, New Growth, Resilience!" was quite a journey for us. How do we start? Neither one of us likes following patterns, nor quarter inch seams – like Lori always emphatically states "they are so overrated!" We collected photos from magazines and the internet for inspiration, choosing styles and designs that appealed to us. We spent several weekends together building the quilt from the center out. We decided to make a medallion center using a Dresden Plate design and added roofs and windows to resemble houses. Then the big question, what next? We auditioned several fabrics as we needed something to set off the medallion. We did something neither of us were qualified to do... we made a checkerboard border with barely 1" strips. That was the most difficult part for us. It was those darn 1/4" seams again, but we felt that it was worth the effort.



We wanted to add some "Folk Art" flowers, but there were so many tiny pieces, we declared defeat. When we found Kim McClean's flower patterns, we resized them to work in our quilt. Kim gave us her blessing. Then Lori surprised me and made some fantastic houses to add to the four corners of the quilt. Just brilliant! Then came X's and O's and a lot more rows of houses. We felt very happy putting the quilt in Marian Drain's gifted quilting hands. What a gorgeous quilt she produced. The fires hit while we were working on this quilt and it became even more important to us. We put as much time, energy and love into this quilt as we could bear with all the sadness taking place in our community. We are so proud and honored to have SRQG trust us in the making if this quilt. It was truly a labor of love.

Genelle Voorhees

You all know our "Queen of Hearts," Genelle Voorhees, who wielded a happy hatchet during the Tri-Guild Luncheon. I'm happy to report that everyone managed to keep their heads. She also happens to be our President this year.

Genelle joined SRQG in 2011, and has been involved in many programs with the guild ever since, but first a little history.



Genelle's mom, dad and sisters all played piano. She anxiously tried to take up the piano as well, but was prone to hog her time on it, so the family decided she should learn how to play violin instead. She never felt she played very well and stopped playing as life required closer attention to more important projects. She recently picked up the violin again, but don't expect to hear a recital any time soon.

She started sewing when she was in fourth grade with her mom who was a seamstress. They would set up their sewing area at the dining room table, and her two sisters would partake as well. She made her own clothes, and bought her first sewing machine, a treadle, for \$10. They lived in an area where the power would go out on occasion, and she delighted in the fact that she could light a candle and continue to sew while no one else in the family could.

Genelle made her first quilt at the age of 15. She made the quilt for her boyfriend out of 2" square calico prints from the 60's. It took her a long time to finish it, and when her boyfriend would visit, she had to hide it from him. When she finished the top, she decided to quilt it like a pillow case, but when she stitched all the way around, she discovered the batting wound up on the outside. Her mother insisted

she get her seam ripper and fix it. Perhaps that is why she didn't make another guilt for 20 years.

Fast forward a couple (few) decades, and we find Genelle has become a most creative and inspired quilter. She embraces the inspiration she finds in other guild members, especially Lori Platt. Genelle and Lori created our 2018-19 Opportunity Quilt, "Our Town, New Growth, Resilience," which has captivated guilters from all over Northern California with its bright colors, imaginative design, and excellent execution. She is grateful that Lori's creative spirit always comes up with such fresh ideas. Genelle also gets a lot of her inspiration from Freddy Moran whose use of bright colors and black and white (NEVER brown, sorry Vicki) echo in Genelle's creations. Freddy collaborated with Gwen Marston on several books, including "Freddy and Gwen Collaborate Again" (available in our library) ... they advise "if you don't have 50 colors in your quilt, it's not a quilt." If you are familiar with Genelle's quilts, you know she takes that advice to heart.

As far as her quilting preferences, Genelle prefers piecing and making up her own patterns. She doesn't enjoy the actual quilting much. Needless to say, she likes bright and bold fabrics like Kaffe Fasset and Tula Pink, plus black and white, and polka dots or checks. With all those choices, she estimates she might have about 15 UFO's that need some attention. One of her current projects is a Millefiori hexi quilt that is all hand cut and hand sewn. As Lori is known to say, "there is that four letter word ... HAND!"

Besides all that Genelle does for SRQG, she also reaches out to help the community. For the past 10 years, she has been teaching young women at the Drug Abuse Alternatives Center (DAAC) how to sew for themselves. During their monthly meeting, seven students learn how to make pillow cases, composition book covers for journaling, aprons, and other practical items. At the same time, they learn valuable life lessons about self-care, and care for their children. Genelle says a lot of people don't understand why she is so involved, but maintains that she loves what she does. "What's more worthwhile than helping people?"

She is very involved with "Beth's Quilting Club" at Roseland University prep. The club was created in memory of former SRQG member, Beth Foley, by her husband Jim, to help young students learn to sew. This May will end the third year for the club which includes twelve girls and three guys. There

The Tri-Guild Luncheon is a once -a-year party for the local quilt guilds to get together to celebrate and foster friendships, create new ones. and. for the course. common love of all things quilt-related. For 2019, it was "The Mad Hatter's Tea Party" hosted Santa Rosa



Quilt Guild. Heading this year's event, Genelle Voorhees, Toni Anderson, and Jan Westerman - the 'A-Team' of A-Teams - put together committees and mini-groups to handle every detail from bakers and sandwich makers to raffle basket coordinators, apron makers, table decorators, costumes and contests, and...so much more. I am afraid that my words cannot recreate this grand adventure through Wonderland but I will try. Shall we begin? We wouldn't want to be late!

Sandwich boards bearing an image of a rabbit in fanciful costume blowing a horn greet guests as they arrive and point the way to the Mad Hatter's Tea Party. Along the way, large signposts point in all directions. Beautifully decorated tables line the hall-way for guest and coat check-in. Large, clear-glass crocks filled with tiny twinkling lights reveal a miniature world of enchantment one might see in a snow globe. From there, we enter the large hall through double-doors. Buntings are strung from above bright and colorful fabric strips that make one feel happy just to pass under.

Once across the threshold and into the party, the atmosphere was magical. There was a photo booth and costume department to the right of the doors and the tea party block turn in table to the left of the doors. Traditionally, the guild hosting the Tri-Guild Luncheon includes a pattern for a quilt block to be constructed and turned in for raffling. This year, there were two blocks to choose from; a paper-pieced dancing teapot and/or appliquéd stacked teacups. Once all the blocks are collected they are sort-



ed into groups and then raffled off to the participants. This year there were multiple sets of 10 raffled. The teapot-to-teacup ratio was perfect and the blocks turned out super cute. I can't wait to see what the winners do with their blocks. I liked these patterns so much, I started my own at home and I am loving it!

The festive decorations in the hall included each guild's own unique Opportunity Quilt. Being together like this is a good way to connect and support each other's Opportunity Quilt Raffle Program - they can be the guilds' major fundraiser of the year.

The tables were classic and beautiful in black linen with matching napkins wrapped with silky straw holding a miniature lithograph reproduction of 19th century "old-timey" cards. Delicate teacups and saucers were distributed around the table. A centerpiece of Alice, perhaps falling down the rabbit hole, was filled with little bags containing a Technique Sharing Workshop project. I can't wait to see how they all turn out. The servers were the best. Their sophisticated, tailored black aprons were easy to spot. A paddle with a Cheshire smile and ribbon flourishes need only be raised to gain the attention of a waiting server.

The Raffle Baskets, containers filled to overflowing with loot of every kind, are one of the things that get people so excited about the luncheon. Fabrics, "sewist" and accouterquilter ments, books, scissors, wine, chocosewing late, chines, more wine, and even more fabric...there must have been over 50 bas-



kets! But there was also the tea. Tea service was presented in pretty little fabric baskets holding a verity of tiny tea bags with cream and sugar on the side. Another thing to love is the lunch (of course). In this case, lunch consisted of tea-sandwiches such as cucumber, egg salad, and deli meats along with a



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Sewlutions

We all try to get the most of our fabric when we cut because it saves time and money, and increases productivity. We buy fabric because we love it, and we want to see it sprinkled in this quilt, and that one, and maybe yet another. Yes, there are yardage apps, or we can look it up online, but that takes time; I can never find my phone when I need it.

I found this great Fat Quarter Yield Chart online and contacted Susan Claire of Gourmet Quilter to see if I could share it in our newsletter. She enthusiastically agreed. I printed this chart out, laminated it, and slipped it under my cutting mat so I am never far away from an answer when the yardage yield question arises. Thank you, Susan, I love your chart! I hope you also find this a useful Sewlution. You can find this chart to print out for yourself at https://gourmetquilter.com/pages/freebies under Free Patterns.

Fat Quarter Yield Chart / Strips & Squares

Below is a chart showing how many strips or squares can be cut from a fat quarter yard. A fat quarter yard usually measures 18" by approx. 22" (half the width of the fabric, generally approx. 44" wide). For cutting purposes, we have calculated the quantities below on a piece of fabric measuring 17" by 21" (the selvedge would run along the 17" length).



April 18 & 19, 2019 Petra Keller

Program: "Crumb Box Treat"

Workshop: "Don't Sweat The Small Stuff"

On April 18, 2019 at the Scottish Rite Building, Petra Keller will present a trunk show which concentrates on a collection of small quilts which have been made with blocks, strip sets, or fabrics that were either left over from other projects or made to reduce a fabric stash. Many examples include "Parent and descendent" sets.





On April 19th, the workshop entitled "Don't Sweat the Small Stuff" with NO foundation piecing will be held at the Village Sewing Center, 506 Lewis Road, Santa Rosa. This workshop is designed to help the student become more comfortable and familiar with resizing traditional pieced

blocks, as well as precision cutting and piecing. We will begin with designing simple blocks on graph paper and then progress to cutting and sewing 3-1/2", unfinished 4" and nine patches, including half-square, quarter square triangles and magic corners. This is a technique, rather than a project oriented workshop, which does not involve templates or paper-piecing. We will discuss possible uses for our small treasures. The completed small scale blocks are perfect for incorporating into "Wearable Art" projects, or accents in quilts. They also make wonderful labels! How about the start of a **Crumb Box Treat?** The supply list will be sent to those signing up for the workshop.

May 16 & 17, 2019 Colleen Pelfrey

Program: "Life With A Border Around It"

Workshop: "Taking Out The Dye"

Colleen Pelfrey will be our guest speaker on May 16th. Colleen grew up in northern California, attended college at UC Davis, and started teaching school as a 4th grade teacher in 1983. She retired in June 2017. She began sewing when she was in eighth grade and sewed dresses back



when she used to wear dresses! She made her first quilt after her first year in college. She made her second quilt years later. When her two sons got older she started playing with designing quilts and creating with and on fabric. Just as much as she likes quilting, she likes telling the stories that go along with her quilts, hence, "Life With a Border Around It." In addition to quilting she likes hiking, biking, motorcycling, cats, family, hugs and Nutella, but not necessarily in that order!



On Friday, May 17th, Colleen will present her workshop entitled "Taking Out the Dye." This workshop is a little a different as you don't need to bring your sewing machine unless you want to and there isn't a project you need to finish. Colleen will start with a little show and tell of guilts

she has made using discharge paste in the design process. She then teaches a variety of techniques for using discharge paste on fabric and demonstrates how to use all of the different tools she has acquired. Then she lets you play with her toys and gives you any assistance you might need or want for the rest of the day. Colleen provides all the tools and the discharge paste. All you need to bring are pieces of fabric you would like to try it out on. She sends you home with a small container of discharge paste so you can continue to play if you wish. The cost of this workshop is \$40 and will be held at the Village Sewing Center.

Also, a thank you to Linda Silva for giving our guild the next-larger size of cutter and many dies that she won in a raffle. Reserve the machines and dies just like a library book. Yes – we give (free) lessons!

Our brand new library items:

FREE-MOTION QUILTING FROM ORDINARY TO EXTRAORDINARY by Jenny K. Lyon – recommended by Diana Roberts

PIN PALS – by Carrie Nelson – 40 "pinnies" (pincushions) – Very important information about types of stuffing – while crushed walnut shells are OK for decorative pincushions, they are not recommended for everyday use because the oil residue in the walnut shells breaks down the plating on good pins! Also – if someone is allergic to nuts, remember that walnuts are nuts!!!

STRING FRENZY – STRIPS, STRINGS & SCRAP-PY THINGS! by Bonnie K. Hunter – This is for everyone who has big pieces, small pieces, hunks, chunks, strips, pieces, and parts. Learn the difference between strings and crumbs – and what to do with them.

JAPANESE IMAGERY IN ONE HUNDRED QUILTS – donated and signed by Judy Mathieson, a SRQG member whose quilt is featured on page 33.

BLOCK – Winter – Volume 6, Issue 1 – by Jenny Doan, Missouri Star Quilt Company – something for everyone from beginners to advanced; traditional to modern; pieced and appliqué. Cute patterns for an elephant and a donkey from squares and half-square triangles. Bonus article about the history of feed sacks.

Be sure to let me know if you find an item that our library "needs" (books, DVDs, and Go! Baby dies, magazines).

| 40" x 60" | Lap quilts for adults to be handed out by Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convales- cent hospitals, and others. | |

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
