Sewlutions

Are you familiar with the different types of batting and what each type can bring to your quilts? I have always used the same kind of batting, a cotton/poly blend. Now, after choosing batting out of habit, I am ready to understand alternatives in my choices. After researching, I feel I have the information I need to make smart batting choices. Here is what I found out:

Cotton/poly blend is typically 80% cotton and 20% polyester. It has the benefit of cotton, but has more loft. It holds up well for projects that will be frequently washed.

Polyester batting holds it shape and thickness nicely. It is thicker but lighter, and keeps you warm without the weight. It is non-breathable, but resists mold and mildew. It is available in several different thicknesses.

Cotton batting is made from natural fibers. It has a nice soft texture. It is usually 1/4" thick and works well for projects that don't require loft.

Bamboo batting is made from 50% bamboo and 50% organic blend batting. It is very breathable and ideal for machine quilting. It holds up well to being washed a lot.

Wool batting is lightweight and warm. It is about 1/2" thick and resistant to creases. It holds its shape well and is a good choice for all kinds of quilting.

Fusible batting contains a fusible web so layers can be sandwiched and basted. Use the wool setting on your iron and press from the center out, pressing each area for 3-4 seconds. Let the fabric cool, then repeat on the other side.

Bonded batting has a light adhesive on both sides that holds the fibers together. The adhesive dissipates in the wash. It also helps with bearding, which is when the fibers push through the fabric.

Needle-punched batting is mechanically felted together by punching it with many needles. It makes the batting firmer and denser than many other options. It is ideal for wall hanging that might sag over time.

Then I found an email from Bolt Fabric and Home in Cloverdale and I *need* what I am looking at in the message: Laurel Burch fabric has an anniversary edition called 'Frolicking Felines.' I called Kate, the owner, and asked for two panels. Two days later Laurel Burch is in the house! Then I remember I have a Dresden Plate quilt-top that's just been waiting for this newly acquired, gorgeous fabric. Inspiration!

This quilt is what happens when Anelie Belden's 'Thoroughly Modern Dresden' mashes-up with Laurel Burch's 10-year anniversary edition fabric, 'Frolicking Felines.' I love Lady Belden's sampler because it's a mix of blades and plates of different sizes. I used her layout as well to keep it simple. She had already done the math. Why would I mess that up?

I have an affinity for mixing bright colors with black backgrounds. I love the drama this combination brings. The pretty purple floral fabric in cotton came from Malaysia. I like to include silk and velvet in most of my work. Usually a special treat left for Halloween, glow-in-the-dark thread is a feature of this quilt. I love yoyos (the little circles on the flowers). Most of these are silk, though some are cotton.

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter and Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, and teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fab- rics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will ap- peal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Fos- ter Care system, and for women re- siding at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults to be handed out by Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convales- cent hospitals, and others.
Doll Quilts	For little girls and boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.
