Program: "A Personal Journey in Traditional Appliqué"

February 19, 2021

Workshop: "Water Lily Raw-Edge Appliqué"

Our February artist is awardwinning quilter Sandra Mollon, whom many of you know and have enjoyed her classes.

Sandra is a California based textile artist with a long love of textiles. She has spent many years working with traditional hand appliqué, and she will share her "Personal Journey from Traditional Applique" with

from Traditional Applique" with us on February 18 during our regularly scheduled Zoom meeting.



Her most recent workshops include art quilts which are photo based. We are going to learn how to make "Water Lily," a rawedge appliqué, for our February workshop on February 19, again via Zoom. I encourage you to visit her website at <u>Sandra</u> <u>Mollon</u> to view her entire collection. Our workshop class will be

hosted by Sandra with assistance from our Zoom coordinator, Ann Nolen.

You will register for the workshop (no money collected) with me by January 17, and I will then forward your email address to Sandra. She will contact you directly for your payment of \$49.95 and give you the supply list and access to the class instructions which are on a YouTube format. You may watch the video as soon as you have paid for the class and as many times as you like afterwards – you own the right to access it! She actually encourages you to start

sooner than the scheduled initial class if you are eager to jump in!

You may freehand a water lily or use a picture of your choosing. If you would like to purchase her pattern, the cost is an additional \$19.95.

The initial class will be at 10 a.m. on February 19 for two hours. There will be two additional follow-up classes, each two hours – dates to be determined, most likely the two Thursdays following the initial class.

Sandra will accept your photos and questions via email, and will critique and make suggestions during the Zoom follow-up sessions. That is six hours over three mornings that you will have her undivided attention, and still be able to work from home and devote as much time as you want to your project! Questions? Technique Sharing Workshop (TSW)



In January we will begin our 9-patch mystery quilt. The blocks will be made over the next nine months and then we will schedule a workshop/or zoom session to reveal the quilt and assemble our blocks.

The quilt is made up of eleven different 9-patch layouts that are 9" finished. Most of the blocks are made more than once, but all blocks are a 9-patch. The thing that makes them different is the color blocks and background placement. The quilt will end up being about 78" x 102".

Each month there will be one or two block patterns released and the number of each you will need to make.

This is a great scrappy quilt!

You will also need a background fabric – a neutral that reads as a solid such as white, cream, taupe, or black would work best.

You will need about 5-1/4 yards of background fabric, or 6 yards to include binding.


If you would like to get a head start, you can start cutting your 3-1/2" squares for the blocks. You will need **396** background squares cut 3-1/2". The additional background fabric will be used in the quilt assembly.

And you will need **351** 3-1/2" squares from your scraps, or your choice of colored fabrics.

This is a fun quilt to make and an easy assembly at the end. I hope you join the fun. Feel free to call me if you have any questions.

all of the cutters and dies that we have in our collection.

With the holidays upon us, you may wish to check out dies for cutting out such items as a sleigh, reindeer, snowflakes, gingerbread people, stars, snowpeople, doves, trees, holly leaves and berries, and more.

By the way – you can also cut light-weight paper, not just fabric. These dies make really cute gift tags and ornaments.

The alphabet and number dies have been used by many members to add words to projects. Lots of quilters like the dies for cutting various widths of borders. There is even a die for cutting a rick-rack border.

I look forward to seeing what you create with the help of the Accuquilt Go! system.

Once again, our thanks to Jan Westerman for getting us started with the Go! system, and to Diana Codding for volunteering to coordinate the items.

Since that day those "real" librarians have always gone out of their way to greet me, and even now with COVID restrictions my husband has been included in their "family" as he picks up books I reserve on line.


When I email "my" librarian at the Sonoma facility I sign my name as the FAKE librarian, and she is so kind and always crosses FAKE off her return responses to me.

Believe in your sacred purpose. Share. Be nosy. Plant seeds. Prepare for your heart's desire. Remember, patience is a good friend. Revel in the bliss. There is nothing quite like it. The universe does conspire to help us, and I am all in.

While at a doctor's appointment with the best doctor ever (Debbie), I shared that I needed my doctor's permission to participate in the California International Marathon, 2019 for a USATF disability accommodation. We did a half-marathon for practice, then the marathon in December. My doctor thought a colleague of hers, Ann Marie, might like my story. Ann Marie is a divine creature. Time passed and I busied myself the way I do until one day, at my doc's office at the end of the appointment, she asked me if I would consider becoming a Santa Rosa Community Health board member. What is happening here?

I smiled, knowing I had been practicing for thirteen years with the Santa Rosa Quilt Guild as a committee chair or Elected Board Member. I said yes. (Yes, is my favorite word. There is so much possibility and potential in this word.) The wheels started turning, my goals forefront in my mind. Ann Marie called. She is so kind and genuine. The sound of her voice was calming, and I was happy to hear from her. We exchanged a few emails. I wrote that I could not stop thinking about my ideas. At the same time, she was writing that SRCH is having a Winter Drive to help struggling families. She told me I could jump in for the children with gifts and comfort items. Ann Marie directed me to Monique who was the lead on the project and another lovely and admirable person.

Even though Monique was on vacation she took the time to write to me, excited to have an enthusiast on the team. I needed to know how many kids and what ages, set goals, and call my people. Because I had already started a closet for the children, I already had dozens of socks, a case of crayons, some Spanish and English coloring books, and handmade blankets for the little ones. I called my daughter, Tawny, first. She added sixty more pairs of socks and some paint pens. I texted my brother, Ryan, asking for a book donation; ten families, ten books. I know the author and illustrator, Jane Tenorio-Coscarelli. She writes children's books on her Latinx culture. Most books come with a recipe and or guilt pattern. They are written in both Spanish and English. When I let Jane know what was going on, she matched the donation.

Then, I wrote my friend, the Tone Man, and told him about some beautiful sketch books that had caught my eye at a local art store, Riley Street. One hundred pages of good paper for kids eight years old and older, plus fancy sketching pencils. He donated a gift card that purchased seven sketch books, seven pencils, and some paint pens. A particularly good start.

I called my other daughter, Jacqui. She ordered forty coloring and doodling books! Yay! I wrote my friend Joe. The kids seven and under need plush blankets. He provided eight gorgeous, fluffy blankets. Meanwhile, more names were added to the list. I went back to Riley Street and was able to purchase eleven more sketch books with pencils and paint pens because the manager there, Jessica, offered a discount in order to help with the project. I spent hours sorting and rechecking and realized we were short a few miscellaneous items for the bigger kids. But I still have kids I have not called upon, so I called my Den-Lop crew (Matthew, Lauren, and Fiona). On the way home from work, Lauren, Matthew's fiancé went to Target. Problem solved. Twenty-three kids in all. Monique, who is the Support Services Coordinator for SRCH, picked up the goods early Wednesday morning. Every child received at least five pairs of socks. Younger kids got coloring books and crayons. Older kids received sketch books, pencils, doodle books, and paint pens. Each family received one of Jane's books. Some families received two. The wee ones received the plush blankets and a small cat stuffy, the same cats I made for Snap-Cats, a sanctuary for cats with special needs, and SRQG 2020 challenge, "Quilted but not a Quilt." Pulling the gifts together for the children for the Winter Drive was wonderful. I was so overwhelmed with good feelings I had to cry a couple of times. (Happy tears, of course.)

Thank you, SRCH, for including me in this important Winter Drive. Thank you to my precious children, to Joe, to the Tone Man, and to Jane for your marvelous and generous support.





COMMUNITY QUILT SIZES

If you are making donation quilts on your own, these are the approximate sizes most needed.

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter and Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, and teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fab- rics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will ap- peal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Fos- ter Care system, and for women re- siding at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults to be handed out by Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convales- cent hospitals, and others.
Doll Quilts	For little girls and boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.

Sew-lutions

Have you ever looked and looked and could not find just the right image for the center of your block? Or how about specific designs for English Paper Piecing? You could use Spoonflower or other fabric print outlets, but that means you have to purchase at least a yard of one design. It is easy to drop images from your computer right onto fabric by printing it from your computer printer. I use fabric sheets that are sold online such as Jacquard Ink Jet Fabric sheets, but there are many commercially ready-to-use sheets to choose from. But in a pinch you can also take one of your own photos and transfer it right onto fabric directly from home. That has the added benefit of letting you print several unique images at one time.

To get started get some medium to heavy weight cardstock, fabric of your choice, (light or white works best) and some spray adhesive. Spray the adhesive onto your cardstock and then apply the fabric. Smooth the fabric with your hands to make sure you have no wrin-



kles. When it is dry, you can print right onto the fabric. Let it dry and voila! As a precaution heat set it, and if it is going to be laundered, make sure to use a color catcher and cold water.




Here is an example of using your own images to print right onto white fabric from home.

As you can see, you can print individual photos, or as many multiples as you specifically need. This is so useful for personalizing your fabric blocks, making a memory

quilt, or printing a quilt label. I have taken a photo of the whole quilt and used it as part of the label, making a nice custom look. The possibilities are endless.






