#### National Quilt Day is March 20, 2021!



It's that time of year to go through those boxes and drawers and pull out your unfinished fabric objects (UFOs).


In the years past when we could meet in person, you pledged \$5 per each item you said you would finish by a certain date. This year as we continue to do everything virtually there will not be any exchange of money.



It's a Mystery!

My thanks to everyone who is sewing along with us on this mystery.

For those who are using a mélange of fabrics for the background I would only suggest that they be very homogenous in appearance when sewn and have good contrast with your chosen "print" scrap fabric. You don't want the pattern to "bleed" into the background.

Just a reminder, Clue #1 is a 9-patch that looks like this.

The 4-patch is the "print" fabric, and the background will provide good contrast.



Using the same pattern, make 10 blocks for Clue #2. Mark them as Block #2 also.

Make **4** of Clue #3A and label them as Block #1.

Make **4** of Clue #3B and label them as Block #4.

Have fun with it!

### Sew-lutions

We all know intuitively that quilting is good for us. In fact the University of Glasgow concluded that all hobbies should be looked at for their mental and physical benefits. In a study, they found that quilting helped cognitive, creative, and emotional health and well-being.

The nature of quilting itself is extremely calming. The repetitive motion of quilting and sewing helps to relax our brain, which lessens the flight or fight response triggered by stress. The sense of accomplishment quilters have when completing a project also ties directly into stress relief, as it boosts confidence in our creative abilities.

Our quilting is time dedicated to unplugging from the world of screens and electronics, focusing instead on creating. Like working on a puzzle, it engages your mind, and keeps your wiring pinging in a different way with every project. Figuring out different block designs and quilt patterns is a prime example of the health



benefits of quilting. Playing with different geometric shapes helps develop and keep important problemsolving skills.

The use of bright colors is uplifting and activity distracts from the stress of the outside world. Plus, continuing to learn is something we can do to keep ourselves fresh and interested. Aren't we smart to be quilters during a Pandemic?

So, KEEP CALM AND QUILT ON!

If you are making donation quilts on your own, these are the approximate sizes most needed.

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter and Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, and teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fabrics.		
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.		
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system, and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.		
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults to be handed out by Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convalescent hospitals, and others.		
Doll Quilts	For little girls and boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.

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
