That well-worn quilt still offers lots of love to snuggle under after all these years.

It was summertime and she was 15 years old. Living with three brothers who grew out of their jeans on a regular basis, she didn't want to let all that fabric go to waste, so she cut the denim up in squares and made a quilt top. Diana gave it to her grandma to finish and helped her tie it. She still has parts of that quilt today and has made sections of it into dog blankets. This was the beginning of her life-long fascination with quilting.

She now enjoys piecing, applique, and free motion quilting on small projects. Diana has made a number of quilts in years past, and remembers when her daughter went to dance classes, she would hand stitch while waiting for her. That quilt was given to her daughter when she got married.

THIS CLASS IS FULL, BUT YOU CAN BE PUT ON A WAITLIST

This is a machine sewing and handwork class, taught by Sheri Cifaldi-Morrill of Whole Circle Studio.

Learn how to make the Double Friendship Knots mini-quilt (18" x 18"). This block incorporates foundation paper piecing on a machine and hand needle-turn



appliqué. In the first class students will foundation paper piece their "scrappy knots" using a sewing machine. In the second class, we'll slow it down and kick back with some handwork learning how to prepare the appliqué and how to apply the layered motif by alternating basting and needle-turn appliqué techniques. Along the way, Sheri will share all of her tips and tricks for both foundation paper piecing and needle-turn appliqué. When complete, students can make their mini-quilt into a wall hanging or pillow. It makes an excellent gift for a friend, partner, or special couple.

All skill levels, confident beginner to advanced, are welcome! Previous experience with foundation paper piecing is helpful, but not required.

No kit required - use your stash! Pattern included in price of class.

The history of the Baltimore Album Quilt is a fascinating journey into an America headed for the Civil War. Discover how the Industrial Revolution, the struggle over slavery, and the social and moral climate of the time contrib-

uted to this beautiful art form. Through stories Jaimie will explore how the demise of Baltimore Album quilts leads us into the hearts and minds of the women who made them, and find out how a pregnancy, a Christmas gift, and a quilt class gone horribly wrong helps to explain the mystery of why these quilts disappeared almost overnight. It's a funny, provocative, and insightful look into some of America's most beautiful treasures.

Formerly a scientist, Jaimie Davis is an award-winning quilter who began quilting in 1993. In addition to making quilts, she designs patterns, kits, and technique-based workshops, and travels widely to teach for quilt guilds, retreats, and quilting festivals.



Her work has been shown in national and international exhibits including the International Quilt Show in Houston, Texas, and the Pacific International Quilt Festival in Santa Clara, California.

Flannel, Friends, and Fun

In early October of 2020, Joann's was having a big sale on flannel. Janet Tonkin, Pam Beebe, and I had talked about getting some solid flannels in bright colors for our NICU quilts. Armed with my credit card I set out one morning to see what I could find at Joann's.

I had a ball picking out these bolts of flannel. I filled up one cart and then got a second cart. When the second one was full, I decided this was probably enough. I had not purchased any fabric since the pandemic started and I was pretty giddy. Needless to stay, I attracted a lot of attention pushing two carts of colorful flannel to the cutting table. My number was called and I pushed the carts up to the cutting table, and the employee from Joann's said "Wow!" and his eyes got wider and wider. "What are you going to do with all this!" I explained how SRQG makes and donates quilts to the NICU and VOM, and how so many of our members are involved in the effort. He was very accurate in his measuring and cutting, but also quite slow. The line behind me was growing and I could imagine that the other customers were wondering just how long they were going to have to wait. Several asked me "what are you going to do with all of this?" And I told again about SRQG and our donations. "That is great" was a common response. Another employee was called in to help, and she was super quick. I heard a sigh of relief from the growing line behind me.

So now I was down to one full cart, much easier to navigate through the store than two. As I waited in the line to pay, my colorful cart was still attracting a lot of attention. I must have bragged about SRQG about half a dozen times while in Joann's. My turn came up to check out and you know the checker

asked me "what are you going to do with all of this?", and you know my response. As I was packing the flannel in my car, I heard "excuse me". The women parked next to me handed me a twenty dollar bill and said "Thank you for all you do with those quilts. I think your group is wonderful." We both had tears in our eves as I thanked her for her donation. Here is a photo of the cart of flannel I purchased.

As I drove home, I thought what a beautiful confirmation of our work and generosity to others was her spontaneous donation to SRQG. While that would be a lovely ending to this story, there is more. Also on my drive home I realized that my house was still under an evacuation warning from the Glass Fire. The evacuation order had been reduced to an evacuation warning. So I thought, I can't take this fabric to my house. I called Jean Chirhart, whose home was lifted from the evacuation warning. She gladly agreed to babysit the flannel till my evacuation warning was lifted. We all love fabric and Jean is no exception. Her eyes got bigger and bigger when she saw how much I had and how colorful it was. "I have a NICU top finished and this blue flannel would be perfect for a backing," Jean told me. "Done" I said as I realized how grateful I felt that Jean would agree to help out on the spur of the moment.

I realized the flannel needed to be washed and I couldn't imagine how long it was going to take and how much water it would use. Thinking of the \$20 donation, I thought "why not just take it to the laundromat and use the \$20 to pay for the washing?" Genius, right? I looked up local laundromats online and read the reviews and chose Montecito Super Wash at 777 Montecito Center. I thought it would be easier and maybe even fun to enlist the help of a couple of guild members to help with the washing. Cheryl Dudley and Carole Behlke both agreed, and even thanked me for including them. We fed the \$20 in the token machine and it sounded like we won the jackpot at the casino as it gave us our wash tokens. At that point, a woman who works there came over and admired our colorful carts of flannel and asked us if we needed some help. She guided us to "Big Bertha," an "8" front loader. I think that means it can accommodate eight times the size of a regular front loader. In any case, it was huge.

We put all the flannel except the solid red in "Big Bertha," threw in a couple of color catchers and loads of tokens, and started her up. We had kind of forgotten how tangled up long pieces of fabric can get when they are washed together. Here is a picture of Cheryl and me with the tangled mess.

At this point Carole and Cheryl were in their element figuring out how best to utilize these counters. What a team! Here are a couple of photos of Carole and Cheryl folding

the flannel. We did not have to buy any more tokens and we did not have any tokens left over.



\$20 was the perfect amount. We finished our washing task in about 1-1/2 hours, just in time to get some lunch at Oliver's and sit outside and enjoy each other's company.

Sew Organized

I recently told a friend that I was going to write a column for my quilt guild called "Sew Organized." She laughed and laughed. I have never seen her laugh so hard. "No, no," I said as I realized why she was laughing, "I'm doing it so that I will get organized. I figure if I have to write about it every month, it will motivate me to actually clean up my sewing room." She still laughed.

How did it get so out of control? I remember a time when I had a sewing basket and all my supplies fit in that basket. This was before I started quilting. There is something very compelling to a new quilter about building a stash. It is almost like you have to have a stash to be a bona fide



quilter. Advice given to new quilters is to buy at least a yard of every fabric that you like or three yards if you really like it. Buy lots of fat quarters for variety and don't forget to buy lights, mediums, and darks in every color to give your quilts sparkle. Then people find out you are a quilter and give you their unused fabric which tends to be twenty years old. And, of course, we have to try out every new technique that comes along, and these techniques come with their own set of tools and rulers and specialty fabrics. Soon we have a roomful of stuff.



My sewing room organization became even more complicated when my mother moved in with us. She had more craft supplies than I did, and three years later she moved away and left all of it behind! I now

have 16 pairs of scissors and 10 rotary cutters with a variety of packages of sizes of blades that don't fit any of the rotary cutters. But I only know this because I started to try to organize the whole mess.

I learned that there are three types of creative people, and one's organization style should match what kind of creative you are. There are the big category organizers who organize by big categories such as

tools, rulers, scrap fabric, and solid fabrics. There are the meticulous organizers who organize down to the tiniest category such as machine needles, embroidery needles, beading needles, hand sewing needles, quilting by hand needles all by size of the needle so that the organization is almost like going into a store. The third type of creative person likes to see everything they have all the time. I am the third type of creative quilter, which gives me a clue as to why some organizing attempts have failed.

On-line I saw a gorgeous sewing room filled with matching storage boxes – a sort of monochromatic, soothing theme. Great idea, I thought. However, when I got home, everything looked the same and I couldn't find anything. I would have to look through several boxes to find what



I needed, and I lost track of what I already had, which lead to buying duplicates when I couldn't find what I needed.

I plan to continue to write about my journey and would love to hear from quilter friends about what has worked and hasn't worked for you. First, think about what kind of organizer you are. Perhaps it will give you some ideas to start with, and if anyone has actually mastered their sewing room organization, please let me know. It feels like an on-going process to me.


NICU Quilts

Santa Rosa Quilt Guild makes and donates baby quilts to the NICU (Neonatal Intensive Care Unit) at Memorial Hospital, Sutter Hospital, and Kaiser Hospital. Members can make quilts of any pattern that finishes the size of 32" x 40" that is appropriate for a newborn.

The Community Quilts Committee provides pre-cut kits for NICU tops (with brief instructions) that are very easy to make. If you would like to make a NICU top with your own fabric stash using the same pattern as the pre-cut kits here are the instructions for cutting it:

Main body of quilt: 48 squares that are 4 -1/2" each.

For a two color quilt: cut 24 squares each of two coordinating fabrics. You will need three lengths of width of fabric, cut at 4-1/2"; then cross cut into 4-1/2" squares.





nating fabrics. You will need two lengths of width of fabric, cut at 4-1/2"; then cross cut into 4-1/2" squares.

For a four color quilt: cut 12 squares each of four coordinating fabrics. You will need 1-1/2 lengths of width of fabric, cut at 4-1/2"; then cross cut into 4-1/2" squares.

Note: there are other variations for the main body of the quilt in addition to the three we list above. Once you start your layout, you will discover other possibilities.

Inner border: Cut four strips at 1-1/2" across the width of the fabric; a solid or "reads as solid" that coordinates with the main body of quilt works well.

Outer border: Cut four strips at 3-1/2" across the width of the fabric; pick a fabric that coordinates with the main body of the quilt.

Construction of the NICU quilt from your kit:

 Lay out the 48 squares in a 6 x 8 pattern that is pleasing. Sew the squares together using 1/4" seams.

COMMUNITY QUILT SIZES

If you are making donation quilts on your own, these are the approximate sizes most needed.

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter and Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, and teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fabrics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system, and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults to be handed out by Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convales- cent hospitals, and others.
Doll Quilts	For little girls and boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.

NICU Quilts continued

- Sew the inner borders using a 1/4" seam to the main body of quilts (long sides of top first, then shorter sides. Be sure to measure the quilt top, in the center and cut the borders to fit before sewing them to the top.
- Sew the outer borders using a 1/4" seam to the inner borders using the same technique as above.

Media: 78" x 56" quilted vinyl pool floaties

Everyone else in my family called it our swimming pool, but to me it was my personal "Pool Floaties Zen Garden."

I had a bit of a habit of picking up a new floaty every time I went to the store. I just loved watching them bounce around off of each other in the warm summer breeze. But that breeze turned chilly and the family decided to sell our pool to a family who might use it more. The eventual buyers where not interested in taking my pool floaty collection and my wife was about to throw them all out, but I just couldn't let them go.

So I decided I would memorialize them in a quilt made entirely of the vinyl pool floaties. Dozens of broken needles, and several self-made sewing machine repairs later I have completed the quilt.

The idea for the image came to me one day while watching them bounce around the pool. The orca bounced into the donut and it looked like it was taking a bite. Then I thought to myself, "Is that a really big donut, or a very tiny orca?" I guess the quilt answers that question.





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
