



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Celebrating 50 Years of Quilts, Community, and Creativity

1976 was a remarkable year.

The United States was celebrating its Bicentennial. Americans were looking back at their history, rediscovering traditional crafts, and taking pride in the skills and artistry passed down from one generation to the next. Among those traditions experiencing an extraordinary revival was quilting.

Across the country, people were pulling treasured family quilts out of cedar chests and attics, eager to learn the stories stitched into every block. Museums mounted quilt exhibitions, books on quilting filled bookstore shelves, and classes sprang up in community centers and fabric shops. What had once been viewed simply as a practical household skill was being recognized as a uniquely American art form.

One event, in particular, helped spark this renewed interest. In 1971, the landmark exhibition **Abstract Design in American Quilts**, curated by **Jonathan Holstein** and **Gail van der Hoof**, introduced audiences to antique quilts as works of fine art rather than merely bed coverings. The exhibition traveled widely and inspired thousands of people to see quilts with fresh eyes. By the time the Bicentennial arrived, quilting had become part of a nationwide movement to preserve our heritage while creating something new.

It is no coincidence that so many quilt guilds were founded during this period—including the **Santa Rosa Quilt Guild** in **1976**.

Those early Members recognized something important: quilting is better when shared.

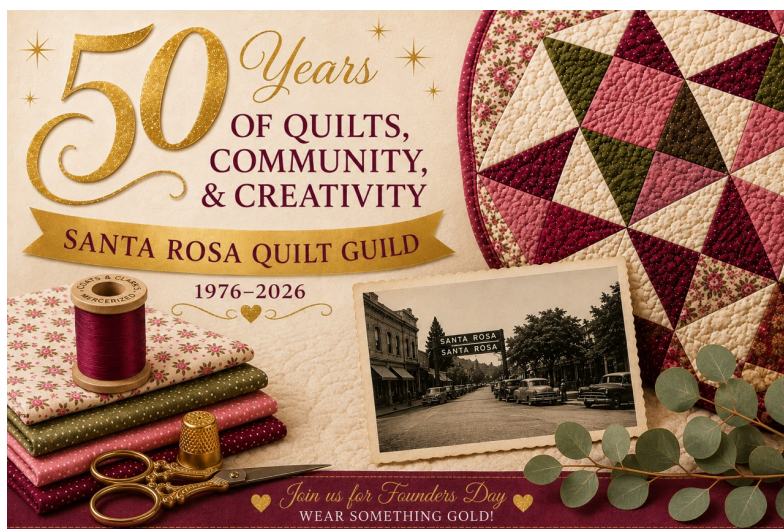
They gathered to exchange ideas, teach one another new techniques, solve quilting challenges, and celebrate each other's accomplishments. They built friendships that stretched across generations and created an organization that would become a cornerstone of our quilting community for decades to come.

Over the past 50 years, the Santa Rosa Quilt Guild has become so much more than a place to learn about fabric and thread.

Where beginners found encouragement.

Where experienced quilters discovered new inspiration.

Where traditions have been preserved while creativity continues to flourish.

This Workshop will explore border options that use simple techniques, and will show how making a simple block can be used to make six variations of stunning borders.



Students who bring a finished quilt top to class (without a border) can begin working on executing blocks for the borders on their quilt.

2026 Member Survey

You Spoke, We Listened

Thank you to the 102 members who participated in the 2026 Member Survey. Your thoughtful responses provided valuable insight into what you appreciate about the Guild—and what would make your experience even better.

The results reflect a healthy, experienced, and enthusiastic Guild. Members value our current programs, particularly Show and Tell, Quiltathons, Technique Sharing Workshops, Sew-a-Row, and the Library. The survey also revealed a strong desire for:

- ◆ More hands-on learning and demonstrations
- ◆ Small-group learning opportunities
- ◆ Programs on machine quilting, appliqué, Sashiko/Boro, quilt design, and color theory
- ◆ More time to interact, discuss quilts, and learn from one another
- ◆ A balanced variety of traditional, modern, art, and cultural quilting
- ◆ More accessible ways to participate in Guild activities

One important finding was that participation—not satisfaction—is often the challenge. Members who take part in Guild activities generally rate them very highly. Before changing or discontinuing programs, we will look for ways to improve communication, simplify participation, welcome first-time participants, and better understand what may be preventing members from becoming involved.

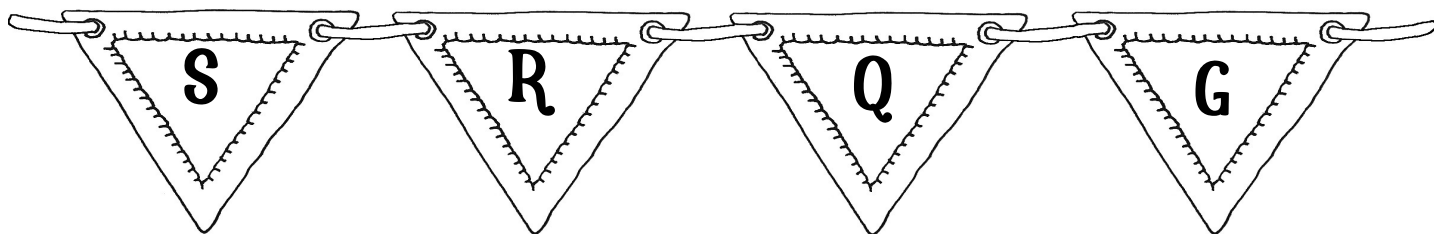
The Board has begun reviewing the recommendations and identifying practical next steps. These may include more mini-demonstrations and hands-on activities, expanded opportunities for member interaction, learning circles / small groups, and programming focused on the topics Members requested most. We will also explore ways for our Members-at-Large to serve as a stronger connection between the Membership and the Board, helping to gather feedback and report on our progress.

We cannot do everything at once, but we are committed to making thoughtful, visible changes, and keeping members informed along the way.

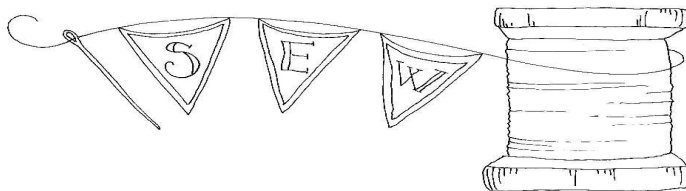

COMMUNITY QUILT SIZES

If you are making donation quilts on your own, these are the approximate sizes most needed.

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter, Kaiser, and Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, and teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fabrics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18-year-olds aging out of the Foster Care system, and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults to be handed out by Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convalescent hospitals, and others.
14" - 18" Square Doll Quilts	For little girls and boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.

Fall Into Quilting At Camp Newman

The "Fall into Quilting" SRQG Camp Newman Retreat is scheduled for October 27–30, 2026, in Santa Rosa. This event offers four days and three nights at the beautifully renovated Camp Newman, including three meals per day and 24/7 access to the sewing room.

The cost is \$650.00 for a shared double-occupancy room. Single rooms are available for an additional 30%, and single ADA rooms are available at no extra cost.

Facility highlights include:

- * Sewing Room: Each quilter will have an 8' table in a space featuring floor-to-ceiling windows, a kitchenette, and outdoor access.
- * Lodging (Village 2): Rooms include a refrigerator, microwave, and coffee maker. The facility features a large social area with comfortable seating, a TV, and a kitchenette.
- * Dining and Grounds: The dining hall provides all-day coffee, tea, and ice/water service with indoor and outdoor seating for dining. You can also enjoy outdoor areas equipped with rocking chairs and fire pits.

We are also planning several optional activities to ensure a fun and welcoming experience for everyone. We hope you join us for this adventure. Deposits are due now.

Community Quilts

Ongoing donations to the NICU at the local hospitals

We continue to make deliveries to the NICU departments at the local hospitals, Kaiser, Sutter, and Memorial, as needed. These quilts are used to block out the bright lights of the isolettes so it is important that they are at least 32"x40". Thank you for taking the extra time to measure your quilt tops before quilting them. If the tops are a little small, please add some borders to bring them up to the appropriate size. A little bigger is just fine. The quilts also serve to bring some color and comfort to the families in the NICU, and the families take the quilts home as well.

Doll Quilts

We need doll quilts! We give doll quilts to several organizations in December each year. A doll quilt should be no smaller than 14"x20". Please note that they are rectangular, not square. They are made up of a top and a back. There is no batting. This is a great use for leftover blocks or preprinted panels or any attractive design you can come up with. Please bring them to any meeting and drop them off at our red "Community Quilts" wagon.

Donation of Quilts for the Emancipated Youth

We donated 11 large quilts to the Emancipated Youth through the basket program that our member Dorothy Murray organizes through Thrivent Financial, affiliated with the Lutheran Church. Dorothy makes up a basket of essentials for the youths aging out of the Foster Care System, and includes one of our quilts and a hand made pillowcase in each basket.

Thank you to everyone who worked at the Sonoma County Fair and made NICU tops from our kits. You will see the tops layered at our upcoming Quiltathon on October 1.

Thank you to everyone for your contributions all summer long of quilt tops, and finished quilts. We appreciate the generosity and creativity of all our members.

Quiltathon: October 1

We hope you are ready to join in the fun at our third Quiltathon of the year, on Thursday, October 1 at the Veterans Building. The Quiltathon is an active event

in which we work together to make quilts that will be donated to the community.

We start with layered quilt sandwiches, smoothing and pinning them. These are stitched around the edges leaving an opening for turning (known as the pillowcase or envelope method). The quilts are then trimmed and turned right side out. The next stage is edge stitching with our expert sewers sewing 1/8" from the edge, catching the opening and making a nice edge to the quilt. The quilts are then quilted by machine. Then,

our hand sewers put on one of our labels. Lastly, the quilts are reviewed by our "quality control" team making sure no pins or needles are left in a quilt, trimming threads, and removing excess lint and threads with lint rollers. As you can see, there is a job for everyone. One of the favorite aspects of the Quiltathon is the opportunity to visit with

our long-time friends and to make new friends. As a thank you for our efforts, our Hospitality Committee will serve ice cream.

The doors open at 9:30 a.m. We have a short business meeting at 10 a.m. then the fun begins! Our greatest need is for Members to bring their sewing machines. We look forward to sharing a productive and friendly day together sharing our talents with our local community. You will receive a detailed email about a week before the Quiltathon with what you should bring.
