PROGRAM AUGUST 19, 2010 ~ "CREATING HEIRLOOMS OF TOMORROW"
WORKSHOP AUGUST 20, 2010 ~ "DESIGN LAYOUT AND MACHINE QUILTING"

Jill Schumacher is a national award winning machine quilter, and began making her first quilts at the age of 12. Having been an art major, Jill has dabbled in many different art forms, but it was not until many years later that Jill was introduced to the art of machine quilting in 1997. She fell in love with this method of quilting and has not stopped since first experiencing the thrill of completing an heirloom quilt.

Creating Heirlooms of Tomorrow

Jill's first machine quilted quilt won the Best of Show at the Siskiyou County Fair in 1998 and went on to take Second Place in the State level competition. This recognition started Jill's journey into competitions and later, the inception of her quilting business, Quiltmaker to the Queen. Jill has taken classes across the country from Master Quilters and is working toward her own certification as a Master Machine Quilter.

Design Layout and Machine Quilting

Learn how to take your quilt top from the "just a top" stage to a finished and quilted heir-loom of tomorrow. Learn how to select the right quilting designs and motifs for each quilt top and learn about the many marking tools that are available today.

If you have an interest in any other TSW for that date, or have a technique to share, please contact me.


Also, on that date the Guild will be hosting a professional photographer to feature your quilted articles in a Guild DVD!

technique sharing workshops

Aug. 5 – "Knot Dollies" with Rhonda Denny. Rhonda will teach us the quick and easy way to make these cute little dolls from the fabric of your choice (even stretch terry, velour or velvet) - knotting the feet, hands and head. They are so cute! Very versatile, these dollies can even be used instead of a bow on any gift, or can serve as a soothing chew toy when dampened and frozen for a short while. Machine washable. Hands-on workshop with some sewing machines needed.

Supply Notes: Rhonda will provide a kit of pattern, fabric, and stuffing for head, all at no charge, to those who signed up.

Bring: Scissors, Straight pins, Hand sewing needle, Various colors of thread

A few people should bring machines.

Aug. 19 – "How Do Judges Judge?" with Elizabeth Marrs

As a trained and experienced quilt judge, Elizabeth will help enlighten us as to the process of evaluating quilts in competition, and help us know how we can improve our quilts. Quilting Inspiration From Other Cultures

Vol.1 No.9 By Linda Morand

We tend to think that America invented patchwork and quilting. There is some evidence that the Crusaders brought back the idea if quilted underclothes from the Holy Land. The idea may have spread from China where quilting was used to make padded clothing to be worn under armor.

Women in all cultures have, out of necessity, created useful items from scraps In Asia the thrifty reuse of material took on a higher spiritual aspect as Buddhist monks who took a vow of poverty wore robes made from patched donated rags. Some monks took great pride in their humility yet were found to have lined their robes with beautiful kimono silks, also donated, but by wealthier patrons. It seems that desire to wear beautiful clothing is timeless and universal even if it must be hidden.

In Japan these humble patched textiles made from reused materials are called Boro and have become highly collectable in the West. See examples at:

The unconscious, improvisational technique in making these fabric-collaged textiles is most appealing. Their random compositions are in contrast to our Western aesthetic need for symmetry. The use of recycled material, random assortments of patterns; color combinations and crude construction techniques are jarring to our taste for technical perfection. Yet, by setting them apart and putting these pieces of utilitarian functional cloth in a space dedicated to their contemplation they become precious art objects. These textiles are valued as art, because, unlike mass produced industrially made goods, the hand of the creator is seen in the final product.

In Korea, women during the Chosun dynasty (1392-1910) pieced scraps of textiles together to make wrapping cloths call Pojagi. Used to cover plates of food on trays, these early pojagi were lined with waxed paper to protect the cloth from stains. In winter, heavier padded pojagi were used to keep the food warm.


The designs of pojagi or bojagi are reminiscent of


