# LURA SCHWARZ SMITH

### **PROGRAM JULY 21, 2011** ~ "SECRETS OF DIGITAL QUILTING" WORKSHOP JULY 22, 2011 ~ "TEXTILE INKING"

Lura Schwarz Smith, with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Art from San Francisco State University, has

been producing textile art for over 30 years. Before that, she was making very bad traditional bed guilts with her first guilting partner, her mother, starting in the 1960s. Originally showing in galleries in the 70s and 80s, for the past years she has been showing quilts and receiving awards at regional, national, and international quilt shows. Highlights of her career are that one of her guilts was named one of the "100 Best American Quilts of the 20th Century," and she was included in the "30 Distinguished Quilt Artists of the World" exhibit at the first Tokyo Dome guilt show in 2002.



She is a member of various quilting and art quilt groups such as Studio Art Quilt Associates (professional member) and the California Fiber Artists. The California Fiber Artists is a group geared more toward gallery and museum shows and sales. Currently, like many artists and guilters, she is working on redoing her juggling act of family, teaching and travel, to manage more time in the studio.

The workshop, Inking on Textiles will be on July 22nd at the Luther Burbank Art and Garden Center. Lura will teach a variety of composition and construction techniques to combine your digital fabrics with other fabrics to create an exciting wall art guilt. If you are an art guilter or just curious, don't miss this opportunity to take a class with Lura.

# Coming in August

Cindy Needham's passion in quilting is turning ordinary antique linens into heirloom wholecloth quilts. Each quilt is one-of-a-kind and they all have stories to tell! During her 60 minute trunk show she will share tips and techniques on how to create these amazing quilts as well as share their stories and inspirations. The quilts are on display and love to be fondled before and after the program!

The workshop will begin with a brief session where Cindy will teach you how to use specialty threads, how to work with your machine tension and correct needle usage. She will have a variety of quilts to demonstrate different threads and techniques. You will be treated to an "Open Thread Bar" where you will have a



large selection of Superior Threads available to use. You will start on a practice panel where you will learn how changing your machine tension affects the stitch quality on each of the decorative threads. You may work on this for the day and you can learn how to thread play on provided floral panels. Cindy also bring supplies to create your own thread fabric. She will be there to help with any questions or concerns regarding threads, needles, tensions, etc.

Cindy would like to emphasize that this class is NOT a commercial. She will educate you on how to use any and all types of threads in your machine but does not bring products to sell. If you have threads that you are having difficulty using, please bring those too and we can do some troubleshooting during class.

# Technique Sharing Workshops

GREAT NEWS! We will use a separate room for most of our TSWs in the future. This will allow greater flexibility and ease for presenter and participants to hear and engage in an intimate workshop environment.

A big thanks to Linda Morand for guiding us through the steps for perfect English paper piecing. This was a bigger project than time allowed so maybe Linda can do it again next year as an afternoon TSW.


July 7 - Our next TSW, however, will be in the big room as part of the community quilting bee. Pam Beebe will teach us how to chain piece using precut fabric for baby quilts as a tool. Bring your sewing machine with piecing foot, thread, scissors, and general sewing supplies. Not only will you learn a fast and simple way to piece but you'll also make a quilt top in the process.

July 21 – Barbara Youngblood will show us how to make a quilt using layer cake squares. If you have a layer cake collection and wondered what to do with it, here's your chance to use it. Even if you don't have a layer cake collection, you can cut 10" squares from your own stash. Bring your sewing machine, general sewing supplies, rotary cutter, cutting mat, neutral thread, and wooden iron.

August 4 – Have you made a tee shirt quilt? If so, please come share your experience and your quilt. This workshop is an open forum to share ideas, techniques, experiences, and tips to make a tee shirt quilt. No supplies are necessary.

Don't forget to sign up for each TSW you want to attend in the binder in back of the meeting room. This helps provide a guide for the number of samples and handouts to prepare. Supply lists can be found there as well as the TSW section of our website.

- 32" x 40" Baby quilts Our biggest need!
- 40" x 40" -- 42" x 42" Toddler quilts in bright colors, or lap quilts in adult themes
- 38-40" x 48-52" Valley of the Moon (big kids)
- 40" x 60" Adult/seniors (only a few needed)

# **Treasurer Needed**

### Treasurer Wanted for 2012

It's not too early to recruit for a Treasurer for next year! Since we have 2-year term limits, a new Treasurer must be found! Thanks to Jan Head, this is our third year of using the Quicken program for our accounting needs. Quicken is an easy program to learn, very flexible in its use, and the program is provided by the Guild. The Treasurer will be given a manual that provides in great detail the steps by which information is extracted from Quicken and makes its way to the various reports and tax returns. The manual also lays out the steps in the reconciliation processes. And I will be available as a resource and guide through the processes.

Here are the skills and qualities that are needed for this position:

# Goodreads

I once heard that Hillary Clinton kept a journal of all the books she'd ever read since childhood, and while I can't claim that, I did begin a book journal in the 1990's just to keep track of books I'd read by one author so I would double dip. Have any of you readers out there bought a book or brought one home from the library, only to find 10 pages in that you'd already read it? Some years ago, in a fit of obsessive-compulsiveness, I transferred this to an Excel spreadsheet, but since discovering **Goodreads**, I don't even have to do that.
