PROGRAM JULY 19 2012 ~ "COLOR, COLOR, COLOR" WORKSHOP JULY 20, 2012 ~ "LUMINOSITY"



Christine is the author of several books and articles written on color and decoration. She has been published in numerous quilting magazines and and has appeared on "Simply Quilts". Look for new articles on color in upcoming issues of *American Quilter* and *American Patchwork and Quilting*.

Join us for this fast-paced lecture on color and how value, temperature and intensity are key to making great quilts. Learn how to use the color wheel to create fresh, unexpected color combinations.

In the workshop, she will show us that the luminosity effect is surprisingly easy to achieve, once you understand a few simple concepts: When you surround a relatively small area of warm, intense color with a larger area of cooler, less-intense, darker color, your quilt will appear to glow, as if light and warmth are coming from behind.



This one-day workshop begins with a crash course in color, followed by evaluation of your fabrics to ensure success. Then you'll begin cutting and piecing your blocks. Along the way, I'll have lots of tips for making the process easier and more accurate. I'll also go over how to cut and attach the "spinning" borders.



Boutique & Raffle



Wine Country Quilts

I am impressed by the care and attention it takes to put on a really good show. This is the third, I think, Moonlight Quilters of Sonoma County Quilt Show where I've volunteered and/or showed a quilt, and I must say, this one was the most touching and tender and bright and beautiful yet.

Times are hard and we are all "shopping in our own drawers." There were upwards of 20 venders and 400 quilts and maybe as many hard working souls. There were steep increases in rents and other expenses in the past year for all of the guilds. The price of cotton went up as did <u>everything</u> else. So, while the price of tickets swelled, so did the efforts and dedication to the cause.

As is usual, I didn't read the fine print when I signed up for a day of volunteering. I'm such a dork. Sometimes my enthusiasm gets me into trouble. I mistakenly thought that one gets a free admission for each position volunteered. Two tours, two tickets - one each for my girlfriends Jonell and Laura. I invited them to be my guests.

My "chauffer" dropped me at the Veteran's Memorial Building at 8:45 for check-in at 8:50. I was the first one to arrive and the interior doors were locked tight. By 9:15 there was a good 20 or so waiting to check in. Someone nabbed a gatekeeper and we flooded the room just as our team of enthusiasts arrived to give us our marching orders. I love my ladies. They look after me like mama hens. Someone interjected on my behalf a certain position was not for me and that some mistake had been made. The poor, exhausted sweetie, Katina (Head Maven), put her head in her hands and asked for me personally. Thank goodness, because I wanted what I signed up for: Hospitality, Security, and finally Opportunity Quilt ticket sales but would be pleased to go where needed.

Meanwhile, Marilyn, manager of hospitality, gave me the task of set-up with a fine woman name Freddie. Freddie is another dynamic and energetic woman on a mission. She essentially did everything while I greeted the "peeps" at the door with hand sanitizer. My guest, Laura, showed up a day early with her darling fur babies, Ricky and Lucy (miniature puppies of adorable persuasions). I apologized in case the error was mine and sent her away to meet on the morrow.

Shortly before noon, I was discharged from hospitality and failed to inform my replacement of all of her responsibilities which resulted in the failure to properly count beans, making a mystery of the number meals needed for lunch. (I guessed, "A Lot!" Marilyn seemed...pleased.) I went on to Security, which is a kick in the pants. I met a darling tiny brunette woman named Jackie, a kindergarten teacher at Oak Grove in Graton. I told her my daughter, Tawny, had Mrs. Moody as a kindergarten teacher at Oak Grove, and it turns out that Jackie replaced Mrs. Moody upon retirement but they have the same assistant....small world.

I had a 30 minute between-gig break, so I went shopping. (It was so hard to wait for my break.) I had spied so many "must haves" that I wheeled around the vendors like a Tasmanian Devil hitting this booth and that until almost all of my long saved dollars were gone. My GF, Jonell, and her son (and our godson), Justin, showed up just in time to win a door prize. They had not been in the building 10 minutes when her raffle ticket number was drawn. She won a pattern from Reet's Rags to Riches which is providence, IMHO, as I have mentioned the "wool gal" at the quilt show many times. Later, I introduced Jonell to Genell - two goddesses of generosity. By then, it was Three o'clock - time to sit with my Lady Phyllis and possibly the prettiest Opportunity Quilt, maybe...ever!

It's a 'Baltimore Album' style made by 19 of the finest applique artists there are. My "quilt-sit mate" spent 40 some hours on her block and it is perfection, as are they all. The four borders each sport more than 60 grapes on a vine. Birds, a rabbit, a tiny dragon fly, and a caterpillar adorn the vines. In each corner a compass, stars to guide a fine ship 'Santa Rosa Beauty', the Centerpiece. It was lovely to get some of the history on its creation. I highly recommend sitting with someone who has worked on the quilt. The time passes quickly and the dough flows in. When the show closed, Phyllis gave me a ride home. I couldn't wait to show my man all my loot.

Dena, from Village Sewing Center, enticed me with a fine new blue-on-blue fabric by Ty Pennington Impressions. OMG beautiful! I am pairing it with a tone-on-tone in creams I picked up for a song at 'In Stitches'. 'Blue Petunia' got me with the dragon pillow case kit, perfect for my nephew Zay's Dragon quilt. From 'Favorite Things' I picked up a vintage crystal necklace to cut up and some sweet daisy trim white petals with red centers. From 'D's Quilting Designs' I had to have a panel in black with flora and fauna in remarkable colors. I found a fantastic vintage brass-looking button with a spider web motif

that is spooky and faboo at 'Missing A Few Buttons'. Finally, but only because I ran out of money, from 'Pincushion Boutique', the Mr. talked me into two lovely sweet treats in deep red berries and roses on black. (Yum, yum.)

When Laura and I met on Sunday it was time to enjoy the quilts. The array was phenomenal. There were sweet, beautiful, inspiring quilts in dogs, cats, and an owl. There was a button clad whale, a forest, a dragon, tea and crumpets, gifts wrapped in bows, and civil war-era in blues. There were both traditional quilts and art quilts. And then there was the Prima Artist, the featured quilter, Barbara Confer. This, it turns out, is a very touching time for my guest, Laura. The recent loss of her mum is still hard on the heart. After looking at a quilt Barbara had made of her own mother Laura told me the pictorial was familiar to her and caused a frog to appear in her throat and perhaps a tear of remembrance. Can a quilt change a life? I think yes.

Most of you know I enjoy an audience. When Laura and I rounded the corner that held most of my work in the show I met Paul Morand - Linda's other half and I had Eva C's ear and her helper with Petaluma Quilt Guild's Opportunity Quilt and pretty soon a couple of others that were passing by asking me questions about the bead work and ideas. I got to talk about each piece and how long it took and which was the most enjoyed. Some preferred the 'Emerald' and some the 'Time and Space'. Most agreed the piece called 'A New Heaven' was "very interesting". My favorite remains the first mini, 'Eye Candy in Pink'.

My favorites of the show were made by friends. Judy K had a cute cat number and Judy M had some bright ethnic pieces and Eva C had made a mini memory quilt featuring tea, pastry and old lace in remembrance of her Grandmother. Pam McV put in a barn owl named Barney. I absconded with her pattern and cannot wait to show you what I did with it! I imagine at this year's Sonoma County Fair many of the same pieces will be viewable again. The quilts are so amazing they are worth a second look.




