President's Message

Embracing the Cozy Season: Hygge, Quilts, and Slower Days

As the days cool down and the light fades earlier, everything seems to move at half-speed — and honestly, I'm not mad about it. When my family lived in Copenhagen, though, "short days" took on a whole new meaning. Around December, the sun popped up around 9 a.m. and disappeared by 3 p.m. On the Winter Solstice, we'd get maybe six hours of daylight. For us Californians, that was tough!

Back here at home, our version of "dark and cold" means a solid nine and a half hours of daylight — which suddenly feels luxurious. The rush of summer slows down, the sweaters come out, and I find myself reaching for tea, fuzzy socks, and a blanket that could double as a small fort. It's the season for comfort, calm, and a little hygge magic.

What Is Hygge, Anyway?

"Hygge" (say it with me: *hoo-gah*) is a Danish word that doesn't really translate perfectly into English — but if "cozy joy" and "simple happiness" had a baby, that would be hygge. It's about soaking in the little things that make you feel warm inside: soft light, good food, easy company, and those slow moments when you can just *exhale*.

It's that *ahhh* feeling when you light a candle, pour something warm, and let the evening stretch out without guilt or agenda. No multitasking, no to-do lists. Just ... existing comfortably in the moment. Think of it as self-care, but with more carbs and better lighting.

Quilts: The Heart of Cozy

And really, what's cozier than a quilt? Maybe it's the weight of it, the softness, or how it seems to hold warmth *and* memories at the same time. Whatever



the secret is, wrapping up in one feels like being hugged — by someone who knows how to make really good soup.

Fun fact: the word "hug" actually comes from the Norse word *hugga*, meaning "to comfort" or "to protect." See? The Vikings were clearly onto something. Whether you're curled up with a book, half-watching a movie, or drifting off with a pet snoozing nearby, a quilt just makes everything softer, quieter, and better.

Slowing Down and Leaning In

The darker days are basically nature's way of saying, "Hey, chill out for a bit." I no longer fight the early sunsets, I just lean into it. Light a few candles, make that second pot of tea, pull the quilt up to your chin, and I give myself permission to just ... not.

Hygge isn't about doing more; it's about being more present in the small, slow moments. So as the world cools and quiets down, find your favorite spot, grab your warmest socks, and settle in. This is your cozy season — embrace it, one quilt-wrapped evening (and maybe one cookie) at a time.

Pattie Klimek - The Joys of Handwork

Pattie Klimek is a traditional hand-quilter, hand-piecer, and hand-embroiderer who works in the San Francisco Bay Area. She lectures and teaches about the *Joy of Handwork* at quilt stores and guilds to remind us of the hand-quilting techniques of generations past, along with her own techniques. Her lectures promote quilting as a time to sit down with friends and work with our hands. Pattie will share techniques as we put away our machines and learn to hand quilt.

Pattie Klimek – Big Stitch Hand Quilting

\$50 for SRQG members (Registration opens November 1, 2025)

\$60 for non-SRQG members (Registration opens to non-members on January 15, 2026)

Big Stitch Hand Quilting is an eye-catching embellishment for your quilt. It can be combined with machine quilting to give texture and details to not only traditional quilts, but art, contemporary, and modern quilts as well.

It is easy to do with the proper needles, a proper thimble, and cotton embroidery thread. In this workshop, you will be introduced to the basics of big stitch quilting: the materials needed, how to baste, how to tie and set a knot, and the rocking stitch. She will go over how to find a proper thimble and how to fit it. Then she will discuss various design elements using Big Stitch Hand Quilting and how to incorporate it into your quilting designs.

(Bring in your quilt tops to discuss and she will help us to choose a pattern using this technique to make your quilt a unique piece of art.)

(Pattie will supply a pre-marked top and batting for a \$10 fee payable to Pattie at the time of the workshop).

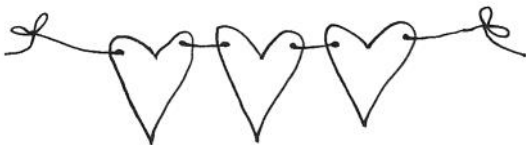

Did You Know? ... Fun Financial Facts

These past two years as the guild treasurer have been fun and a nice learning experience.

Do you know how much it takes each year to keep our guild going at its present state? This information will be presented at our meeting in November, and I will try to answer any questions that come up. Please come to the meeting on November 6 to learn more about our average annual expenses, and the proposed 2026 budget. Once the Board approves the proposed budget, it will be emailed to the membership. I will have a few copies available at the meeting, as well.

Did you know that there are local markets who donate 3% of your purchase price to our guild when you sign up? Local markets donate to our guild through an easy program called eScrip. It is super easy to participate. You get an eScrip card from each of the stores you patronize. You simply fund-raise every time you shop at one of the following participating markets in Sonoma County: Oliver's, Petaluma Market, Molsberry Market, Sonoma Market, and Glen Ellen Village Market.

Do you know the average price of a professional speaker presentation at our guild meeting? It is an average just under \$500 per speaker.

Do you know how much money the guild has raised this year from the estate sales? A lot!! We have added \$17,000 to our account from the generous donations from several sewing room stashes. Remember to have the guild in your will or trust, and let your family know, too.

Anniversary Block

Make a patch (or two), get a ticket and a chance to win the finished quilt.

The winner will be drawn at Founders' Day, September 2026.



To make the block you will need eleven 2-1/2" squares: five light colored (small prints just fine); five scrappy, medium to dark; and one pink or red. Jan or I have pink or red squares if you don't have any.

Draw a diagonal line on the back of two light squares. Place one medium to dark square right sides together with each of the two light squares, and sew on the drawn line. Trim the seam and press toward the darker fabric.

Refer to the above picture to sew the squares together. Note that your pink or red square will be the center patch.

Please sign the block on the front with your full name.

In order to finish the quilt on time we need your finished blocks by June 2026.

Community Education

Finley Quilting Class

The first of four quilting classes at Finley has been completed. During the initial two months, participants are focused on making nine quilt blocks, allowing them to build foundational skills in the quilting process.



In the third month, the instruction shifts to sashing, borders, basting, and stabilizing the quilt top. These lessons aim to help participants prepare their quilts for the final stages.

The last month is dedicated to learning walking foot quilting techniques. If time permits, there will also be an introduction to free-motion quilting. The schedule is ambitious, and we are learning ways to meet the challenges.

The teachers are Sue Stone, Rena Ferrero, Michelle Proto, Pleasant Vitali, and Karin Wesner. They have steadfastly worked hard to make these classes a reality. I cannot thank them enough.

We could not do the Community Education programs without donations. Thank you to Nancy Kuhn, Norma Viglienza, and Janet Tonkin for providing wonderful sewing machines. In just the last two months, we have received donations of supplies from Laura Barrett, Diana Watson, Nancy Kuhn, Justine Lott, Rena Ferrero, Andrea Van Voorhis, Lynette Whitman, and Elizabeth McDonnell. Georgiann Morrissey and Elaine Ramires are donating machines in November.

Village Sewing Center Classes

An Alphabet of Little Presents

The holidays are fast approaching, and we are all trying to find ways to tell our favorite people that we love them. One of the most memorable ways is to make something small and personal. Here are a few ideas to get you into the creative frame of mind.

A: Apron - Do you know anybody who couldn't use one? Consider making the top part from an appropriate Tee shirt.

B: Button jar - I once gave a young woman who had no family heirlooms or other old goodies a pretty jar full of old buttons, some of them antiques. She was delighted. Also consider Burp cloths, Bandanas, and Backpacks. Not the heavy duty ones that kids carry to school but the smaller medium weight ones taken to Grandma's or to a sleepover. Bowl cozies are nice, too.

C: Coasters - seasonal or otherwise. Cell phone wallet. Candle rug.

D: Dishtowels - I have a friend whose refrigerator is decorated with a Mary Englebright paper doll house. Each of her grandchildren is represented by a Mary Englebright paper doll with the face replaced by a photo of the child in question. If I were making dish towels, for her they would either be made of or trimmed with fabric by the same artist.

E: Eyeglass cases - either for prescription glasses or sunglasses or reading glasses. Crazy quilting is nice for these. Or embroidered initials.

F: First aid kit - for the car in a tidy little pouch that will fit in the glove compartment.

G: Gingerbread house and/or people - Just use brown fabric with a basic "pancake" style stuffed toy or a simple little house of any size. Decorate with white rickrack "frosting" and/or twist red and white rickrack together to make "peppermint" trim. Or if you are doing this with a child, use the T-shirt paint that comes in a squeeze bottle.



H: Hair scrunchy. Hot water bottle cover - for this choose something cozy and washable, maybe fleece or corduroy.

I: Ice pack or warm pack - There are a number of substances that can be put in the refrigerator for a

cold pack or in the microwave for a warm pack. One of these is dried corn. Please do NOT use popcorn. The cutest I've seen was shaped like a cat with the head and forepaws at one end of a letter C intended to go around a human neck, and the hind paws and tail at the other end.

J: Jewelry roll - A piece of pretty fabric on the outside and pockets on the other. You tuck the jewelry into the pockets inside, roll the thing up with the pockets inside, and tie the roll closed with a ribbon attached to the outside. Jelly jar tops are nice too. You cut circles of fabric with pinking shears, or sew a pretty trim around them and use these over the tops of jars containing something nice. Pickled watermelon rind? Candied orange peel? Or maybe you pad the top to make a pin cushion and fill the jar with bobbins or other sewing necessities for a college student.



K: Kit with everything necessary for a new project - perhaps the beads and cord to make a necklace, or the yarn and knitting spool to make a baby cap. This kind of thing is especially thoughtful for people who have been taking ski adventures and are going to have to be in one place for a while. Or make a children's music kit with maybe a recorder, a harmonica, and a rhythm instrument or two. You put these things in a drawstring bag and hand them off to the kids at the airport when they are seeing you off, being sure that you have your boarding pass firmly gripped in the other hand.

L: Luggage tags, Lavender sachet, Lunch bag.

M: Miniature quilts - Our guild library has all, or virtually all, issues of the defunct magazine MINIATURE QUILTS. Some of these are hard, and some are very easy. They are nice to hang with or without a frame, drape over the back of a chair, or display with a doll or teddy bear.

N: Napkins are always nice. Sets of them are especially good. Inexpensive notebooks can be jazzed up by covering the covers with pretty fabric or paper. Mod Podge is especially helpful here. Nuts and bolts can also make a nice present. We once gave a military bride a collection of small hardware in baby food jars. We fastened the lids of the jars to a nice piece of wood with screws, put the various kinds of screws, nails, and hooks in the various jars, and screwed the jars onto the lids. The bride was very pleased.

O: Online classes - Consider paying for an online

class for a distant loved one. Especially consider taking it with them. **O** can also stand for onesies which are very quick to personalize for the youngest ones. Consider tie-dye, embroidery, or a little skirt of fabric or eyelet. **O** can also stand for ornaments. If you use family photos printed to fabric to personalize these ornaments they will be cherished.

P: Pillowcases can be made in 15 minutes. Follow the tutorial in our Guild website. **P** can also stand for pot holders and pin cushions and pot scrubbers (little net balls). There are whole books of pin cushion ideas in our library. There are also whole books of postcard quilts which are basically fabric collages held together with fusible (think Wonder Under) stuck to cardboard so that they can in fact be mailed as post cards.

Q: A Quilt of any size makes a lovely present.

R: Rag edge quilts are the easiest. You sandwich your blocks with back, batting, and front (perhaps the front of a stabilized tee shirt). Sew together with 1/2" seams on the OUTSIDE, clip the seams about every half inch being careful not to cut the seams, and run the thing through the washer and dryer. **R** also stands for Raggedy Ann and Andy. Large or small these make good company at any age.

S: Shoe bag for the clothes horse among us, but also a shoe bag made to go over the back of the front seat on the car to make tissues, snacks, small toys, and other amenities available to passengers in the back seat. **S** can also be a scissors holder to keep this tool safe and handy. Also Stuffy - stuffed toys - for children and college students.

T: Towels with a bit of something extra. Sometimes it's hard to find someone's favorite color combination. I was once planning a present for a bride whose colors were (I think) rust and teal. Who makes anything in that combination? I got a set of sheets and pillow cases in white and embroidered the edges of the top of the top sheet and the hems of both pillow cases. I did this by hand with a simple threaded running stitch but it would be almost as fast and easy to do it by machine. Or you could trim purchased towels with a border of Seminole patchwork just above the hem. So much for your friend's mauve and yellow bathroom. **T** can also stand for a teddy bear which works well in patchwork, or for a throw which might be made of fleece.

U: Utility fabrics such as the microfiber clothes used to dust with. If you give someone something all that useful, be sure to give it in something pretty.

V: Vintage fabrics either as found or repurposed - I saw a sweatshirt online with the word VINTAGE on it, the letters cut from bits of what had once been a quilt. Someone asked the wearer if she was vintage, or the shirt was vintage, or she liked vintage. She said, "Yes." **V** can also stand for velvet, velour, or velveteen, any of which can lend beautiful texture to a gift.

W: Wall pocket - Maybe you haven't seen one of these recently, but they can be a boon to people with toddlers or kleptomaniacal cats. Basically they are pockets that hang on the wall. My great-grandmother had some that were vases to hang flowers in. I had one that hung in the laundry room. She was a Sunbonnet Sue with a muslin backing to her dress, and bonnet to form a pocket. Anything found in the pocket of something about to be washed went into the wall pocket - except money! **W** can also be a wash cloth which looks nicer with a jolly bit of trim or stitching. One little boy receiving a shoebox present was especially pleased to have a wash cloth of his own because now he didn't need to share one with three other little boys.

X: eXotic trim - when I was in a long convalescence from my only serious childhood illness, a friend of my grandmother sent me a bundle of bits a beautiful fabric. Some were silk. Nearly all were old. Long ago you used to be able to send a couple of labels from bias binding and a few cents, and the company would send you an assortment of bits and pieces suitable for small creative projects such as doll clothes.

Y: Yarn holder - Avid knitters or crocheters sometimes have trouble keeping their yarn out of the paws of kittens - human and feline. A bag with a grommet in the side for the yarn to come out would be easy to make and prevent a lot of tangled yarn.

Z: Zipper pouches. At the craft show last year I bought from a member of our guild two zippered pouches. I hope I can buy a few more this year. They are big enough to hold a flat piece of computer paper. The back inside and outside are printed cloth. The front is mostly taken up with a window of clear vinyl so you can see everything in the pouch. The edges are bound and there is a zipper near the top of the front. I use these for small sewing projects and for important business papers.

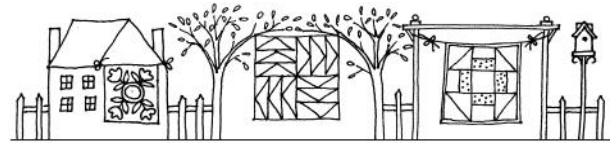
We hope you enjoy the winter holidays, and winter solstice with family and friends.

If you are making donation quilts on your own, these are the approximate sizes most needed.

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter, Kaiser, and Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, and teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fabrics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18-year-olds aging out of the Foster Care system, and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults to be handed out by Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convalescent hospitals, and others.
14" - 18" Square Doll Quilts	For little girls and boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.

I have been a member of SRQG for 13 years, and for 12 of those years I have been a board member or a committee chair, or a combination of both.

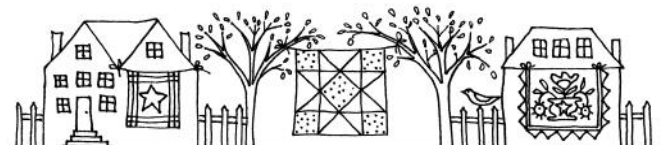
I'm taking a break.

A story for you ...

He used to fall asleep to the sound of her sewing.

In 1888, in a small farmhouse outside Hannibal, Missouri, Thomas Avery came to love that quiet rhythm more than any hymn—the soft hum of the wheel, the gentle pull of thread through cloth. His wife, Clara, would sit by lamplight long after supper, stitching patch after patch into quilts that kept them warm through winter. She never said much, and she didn't need to. The sound of her sewing was her way of speaking, a steady promise that life, for all its wear, could still be mended.



When the fever came, the house grew too still. The lamp burned low, the chair sat empty, and the silence felt heavy enough to crush him. For weeks after she passed, Thomas sat in that same chair just to feel the quiet pressing in. The unfinished quilt lay folded across her table, a pattern half-complete, needle still threaded where her hand had stopped. He tried to ignore it at first, but the silence gnawed at him until one night he unfolded the fabric, clumsy fingers tracing her last stitches.

It took months to learn—pricking his hands, cursing the thread—but in time, the rhythm returned. Slow, uneven, but there – the hum of the wheel, the soft pull of cotton through cloth.

Neighbors said he'd lost his mind, sitting up late every night sewing by lamplight. But when that sound filled the room again, it was like she'd come back—just for a while, just enough. When he finally finished the quilt, he laid it across their bed and listened to the silence that followed.

And he couldn't help but wonder: do we keep sewing for the ones we lost, or for the holes they left behind?
