That kind of boldness is welcome. That's how we refine, improve, and stay relevant. It is what also spurred the topic for my President's Message.

When I sit near you at a Workshop or Guild activity — especially alongside our newer members — I may ask what's working, what feels confusing, or what ideas you have. That's intentional.

Feedback isn't about pointing out flaws. It's about shaping a Guild we're excited to belong to. One where meetings feel purposeful, Volunteers feel supported, communication feels helpful rather than overwhelming, new members feel welcomed, and long-time Members feel valued.

The more we share what's working and what could be better, the stronger and more welcoming we become. Please keep sharing your thoughts, ideas, and observations. I'm grateful for your patience, your kindness, and your willingness to help refine how we work together.

We're building this Guild one stitch at a time — and I'm thankful to be stitching alongside you.

Trunk Show

Mac McNamara lives in San Francisco and is a frequent speaker at quilting associations around the state, and at Handicraft and Art Fairs. Mac is known for quilt designs which seem haphazard, disconnected, and random. But they keep you looking, searching for a structure, a deeper meaning, and that is Mac's intention. There is always a deeper meaning below what is readily apparent in his quilts. In describing his quilt making process, Mac says that he essentially sews in curves and if done correctly, the quilt will lie flat. Mac loves to have his quilts hanging next to quilts made by children because "children have a certain freedom to do what they want without the limitations that we adults have learned over the years."

Community Quilts Sew Day:

We are going to try something new and have a Community Quilts Sew Day on March 20, 2026. The goal of the day is to finish 15-20 lap size tops. This is NOT a quiltathon. There will not be any handwork.

We will provide pre-cut kits and instructions to make these tops. Our expectations are that you will bring your sewing machine and be ready to make a lap size top from a kit provided. We have room for 20-24 sewing machines. To make the piecing go smoothly, we will also have 8-10 people who will press the blocks, do pinning, and any trimming necessary. We will use our 'teamwork' to get the tops finished.

Our expectations are that if you don't finish the lap size top, you will take it home and finish it and return it by the April 16 meeting.

We received a couple of donations of beautiful fabric and thought this might be a good way to use it. Barbara Southard and Liz McDonnell are choosing the patterns and making the kits for the tops.

Little Bits with Jackie Pitts

Recently I had lunch at a friend's house. Because of the unseasonably cold weather we were in her house rather than on her deck where in times past we have enjoyed the company of her redwood trees. Two of these are missing now, and they are missed. They were planted when she and her late husband were newlyweds. Since he died some years ago, they have continued to keep guard, but two of them were becoming a danger to the neighbor's house and had to be taken away. The neighbor has enough troubles [including a recent stroke] and doesn't need the danger of a large tree falling on his house. Even these trees, which look eternal, are subject to time and change. I've sometimes wondered what life feels like to a giant redwood tree or a sea turtle with an unhurried agenda, but then as far as anyone knows no tree or turtle has adventures equivalent to raising my kids or making my quilts. So, I will gladly give thanks for the human portion allotted to me. Some degree of tranquility is to be enjoyed through the institution of tea.

The beverage of tea has been with us a long time since its origins in Ancient China, but the institution of tea in the English-speaking world is a thing of the last couple of centuries, coming to us from British India. Most of India is hot and the local people like to get anything strenuous done in the relatively cooler mornings and then clean themselves up and enjoy a quiet time in the afternoon before a relatively late evening meal. The English brought this home with them and made it their own. So, I have had the fun of taking tea at the Victoria and Albert Museum in London, and in many much homier settings both in the UK and in the United States. There is a vast amount of lore concerned with tea, far too much for me to even hint at here, but the article that might especially catch a quilter's eye is a tea cozy. This very practical piece of equipment is designed to keep the teapot and its contents hot for a long time and therefore prolong the opportunity for conversation or quiet meditation in unhurried solitude.

My friend of the redwood trees collects teapots. The one we were using and several others wore tea cozies of the simplest and most effective kind, made of quilted fabric. They appeared to be made of the sound portions of defunct quilts. Make or obtain two pieces of quilted fabric, each measuring halfway around the teapot by the teapot's height from top to base.

Hem or bind the short sides. Make a casing along both long edges of both pieces. There are several things you can use for cording. Don't use yarn as it will knot up. You can't go wrong with grosgrain ribbon. It is tough and washes well though you probably won't need to wash your tea cozy very often. Run the cording through the casing at the top of both quilted pieces, using a large safety pin or a bobby pin to lead it. Leave enough cording at each end to tie a bow. Now do the same with the bottom casing. Now put the cozy on the teapot by placing the spout between the two quilt pieces and drawing up the cozy to fit the teapot, tying a bow right over the handle and one right under the handle. A tea cozy of this kind will keep your tea hot for a long time.

What do you serve with tea? Well, my friend and I enjoyed raw veggie bits dipped in something, I think ranch dressing, homemade bread, scones, and lemon curd. She says lemon curd isn't hard to make, but if I even wrote the recipe I'd have to apologize to my arteries. At the Victoria and Albert Museum, you get itty bitty dainty sandwiches, scones, and something of a creampuff-like nature, maybe dainty cookies. Finger food of some sort is the general idea. When there are young people involved such as kids returning from school there are traditional options. Since caffeine is thought to be one of the paradoxicals, in that it is thought to have the opposite effect on children from the one observed in adults, it may make them sleepy. I'm not suggesting that you give your grandkid an espresso so that he will take a nap. A traditional answer to this is called "cambric tea." Basically, this is milk with just enough tea to color it the color of cambric with sugar to taste. Your taste, not his. Graham crackers are a traditional health food, and Fig Newtons are basically fruit and cake. If you don't need caffeine in the late afternoon, consider the many herbal teas. Lemon ginger is my favorite.

When my sons were little boys, we had a special Twelfth Night Tea. Christmas toys were allowed to sleep under the Christmas tree until Twelfth Night at which time there was a parade from the Christmas tree to the dining room. Since there were lots of animals and wheeled goods this could be a pretty long parade. There was a theatrical performance at the puppet theatre which could be anything from the Nativity to the Adventures of Mickey Mouse. All former Christmas toys were invited, my childhood doll Rosie presiding from the high chair once the children had

Many back copies of Alex Anderson and Ricky Tims' "The Quilting Show," as well as tutorials by various quilters, and even some quilt shows. (Hint: type in DVD in the Search Box to see what is available.)

ACCUQUILT:

Contact Janet Tonkin to check out a cutting machine, as well as a large assortment of dies, and instruction/idea books. Accuquilt information is available at the bottom of our Library's Home Page.

RULERS:

I have seen many other kinds of tea cozies, some very fancy. There were knitted ones at a place in Oregon. There are big half circles that fit over the whole teapot. One was made like an old Russian woman who hid the teapot under her skirt. I once had one made from a panel depicting a big cat curled up on top of the teapot. She was pink with a pink gingham ruffle all around the bottom. However you do it, I suggest that you obtain and use a tea cozy as an investment in quiet, conversation, and sanity.

2026 Guild Challenge

What is a Guild Challenge?

Many of our new Members may not have heard of the yearly Guild Challenge, or they may be wondering what it is all about. It's an opportunity for all members to create a quilt based on a theme with specific parameters set by the Challenge Coordinator. Think of it as an invitation to create something outside your normal quilt making routines. Try new techniques, designs, ideas that you believe fit the theme and constraints set by the coordinator. This year's theme is "The Dash."

I have heard a lot about the "Dash" lately via posts and conversations. I looked up the definition of "Dash" and found it used in different ways, but the most relevant to our Challenge is: **A race over a short distance.**

Here are the parameters:



- Base your quilt on your favorite memory


