Threaducation

WISE WORDS FROM MOTHER SUPERIOR

Have you wondered why thread gets thinner as the weight or thread size number gets larger? It is confusing but there is a reason behind this system. Here is a simple analogy to illustrate why:

The goal is to determine how much thread it takes to weigh one pound. Thread A takes 20 miles to weigh a pound so it is labeled as 20 wt. Thread B takes 40 miles to weight a pound and is labeled 40 wt. It is a finer thread because it takes 40 miles to weigh one pound. Thread C takes 60 miles to weigh a pound so it is even finer yet.

EDUCATION: Monofilament threads

I recently received an e-mail asking if invisible monofilament thread is iron safe. She had heard that it melts if ironed. That is a commonly asked question and most likely due to hearing sad stories of monofilament threads melting and damaging a sewing project. Here is the truth.

There are two main types of monofilament threads: nylon and polyester. Traditionally, most monofilament thread has been nylon. Nylon is strong but it has some negative properties for sewing thread. It tends to go brittle over time, discolors (yellows), and has low heat tolerance. Nylon melts at approximately 400 degrees F. Although most irons do not have a numerical temperature setting, many irons can melt nylon when set at medium or high heat. The preferred material for monofilament thread is polyester. Polyester does not discolor, go brittle, or have a low melting point. Polyester melts at the 480 to 510 degree Fahrenheit range and most irons stay well below this temperature up to the medium heat setting.

Our <u>MonoPoly</u> monofilament invisible thread is 100% polyester, thus the name, **Mono**filament **Poly**ester.

Another caution: Watch out for monofilament threads labeled as 100% Polyamide. That may lead us to believe it is polyester but polyamide is the chemical word for nylon. Dishonest labeling? No. Misleading? Yes.

Be safe and stay with polyester when using monofilament threads.

Technique Sharing Workshops

Here's a good example of best-made plans. I prepared an article for the September newsletter then forgot to send it to Jan to be included – so here is the part that's relevant. We had a large group for Justine's demonstration but only five sewing machines were present. Those who put the pieces together were delighted with how much they were able to accomplish in an hour.

In September Betty Upchurch taught us how to make a chenille scarf about of woven cloth. This is a perfect gift and one that is quick to make. Most of the attendees watched but a couple brought the materials to make it and worked on it under Betty's diligent eye.

The October TSW included two demonstrations. The first was a tissue holder given by Georgiann Morrissey. I think most of us were surprised at simple it is to make. Another way to use fabric fragments that you have stashed in your "leftover" bin. Our second demo, how to do self-binding for a quilt was done by Mary Wood. She not only demonstrated how to do this but also had prepared a sample for each participant. The sample showed you each step on a square block. I am personally grateful to have learned how this is done.

Thank you to Justine, Betty, Georgiann, and Mary for letting us in on a few secrets. If you missed one of the TSWs and want to know more, check out our website under TSW.

Pointless Sisters

You are invited to participate in SAQA's Interactive Critique Session and Trunk Show at our November 22 meeting.

On Tuesday, November 22, the Pointless Sisters will host at the Luther Burbank Art and Garden Center, 2050 Yulupa Ave., Santa Rosa, a traveling trunk show and critique session from the Studio Art Quilters Association: *This* is a Quilt! The trunk show is a wonderful way for guild members and nonmembers alike to view and engage with quilts made using a wide variety of styles, techniques, and fibers.

Starting at 10:30 members and guests will view the 39-50 quilts in the trunk show and then form small groups to analyze the pieces using a suggested guild line script provided by SAQA. The pieces are in 12" square white mats with 8" openings, and are presented in clear envelopes with artists' statements on the back. Some trunks also contain 3D pieces housed in acrylic boxes.

Curated by Deb Cashatt and Kris Sazaki, the traveling Trunk Show showcases SAQA's diversity of talent and its mission to promote the art quilt through education, exhibitions, professional development and documentation. Two hundred sixty-eight SAQA artists at every level of their careers answered the invitation to submit a quilt to the Trunk Show, in order to answer the question, "How do we as SAQA members explain what we do --- create quilts -- without people immediately thinking of a nine-patch that goes on your bed?"

Michael Solomon, formerly of the Solomon Dubnik Gallery in Sacramento, California, chose 50 of the quilts to become part of the permanent collection of the Kresge Art Museum at Michigan State University after the trunks finish traveling. SRQG, Pointless Sister and SAQA member, Cathy Ortelle's work was selected from last year's Trunk Show to be a part of this prestigious collection.

More Threaducation!

EDUCATION: Automatic Tension Settings on Home Machines by Bob of Superior Threads I have done something that I would bet you have never done before. I read the owner's manual of a sewing machine, cover to cover. Every page, every word. Although it was about seven years ago, I remember it still today because of what I learned. The manual was for a new top-of-the-line machine which Heather (Mother Superior) just bought. This was back in the old days when they were only \$6,000. It must of been a slow day because I do not read owner's manuals for anything. I remember reading the chapter on top thread tension because this machine had an automatic tension feature. It

was page 51. "This machine is factory preset to sew using a 50 or 60 wt. polyester thread." I read that again and thought, "Heather usually doesn't sew with a 50 or 60 wt. polyester thread on top. She pieces with cotton. She quilts usually with a 40 wt. poly or cotton thread. She embroiderers with a 40 wt. thread. So why is this fancy machine, advertised for quilting and embroidery, factory preset to sew with a thread that is rarely used for piecing, quilting, or embroidery?" That's when the light bulb went on and enlightened my thinking. Sewing machines are built around the world for the world. Regardless of advertised quilting or embroidery features, they are first and foremost sewing machines. The world sews. We quilt. We embroider. Machines are made for the world.

Factory preset tension settings for sewing are different from those required for quilting and embroidering, so a just-out-of-the-box new machine is not set for quilting or embroidery functions. Most machines have a tension scale ranging from zero (no tension) to 10 (very tight ten-

sion). The average factory preset tension setting is at 5.0 and remember, that is for a 50 or 60 wt. polyester sewing thread. If you use a cotton, metallic, silk, monofilament, delicate, sensitive, or heavier threads, a tension setting of 5.0 is too tight in most instances. We have about 25 different types of threads including fine, medium, and heavy threads in various fibers. The most common tension settings recommended for the majority of our threads range between 2.0 and 4.0 (for a chart showing



recommended tension for all our threads, click here). And most machines are preset at 5.0. That is too tight for most piecing, applique, quilting and embroidery applications.

So what does automatic tension mean? Can a machine sense every different type of thread, fabric, batting, backing? Of course not. Automatic tension means that the machine adjusts (usually lowers) the top tension setting when some specific stitches are selected or when the embroidery function is engaged. It does not make adjustments for sensitive threads, fine threads, or decora-

tive threads. If you use a range of different threads, it is important to learn how to manually adjust the top tension and not rely on the automatic function. I guarantee this will solve many sewingrelated problems and open the door to new possibilities. You will be jumping for joy as you successfully use threads you have not been able to use in the past.
