President's Message

At the beginning of the New Year, I believe it is expected that we are to look into the future and make all kinds of resolutions of things that we are going to try and change, but I have decided that I want to look to the past year and reflect on what we as a guild have accomplished. You collectively have created 1527 Community Quilts, 517 of which went to the Veterans. You have donated 24 fidget aprons, 650 knitted birds nests that help the Bird Rescue Center, and countless knitted and crocheted hats and scarves that are donated to schools and Veterans. We have donated \$300.00 to the Haitian School of Blessings which was matched by Superior Threads so that this organization that is helping women become self sufficient has an abundance of thread to help them on their way. You have donated 500 pounds of food to the Redwood Empire Food Bank and over \$400 to the Drug Abuse Alternatives Center. I hope you are as proud of your accomplishments as I am....these are contributions individuals have made that are all wrapped up into the name "Santa Rosa Quilt Guild "

I was thinking about our guild and how it resembles a living and breathing quilt. You have the accent fabrics, the ones that stand out and shine. But you also need the background fabrics, the more quiet ones that hold it all together. There are medium colored fabrics that get their definition from their neighbors... sometimes they are light and sometimes they are dark. And just like all of you, our place in the living breathing quilt ebbs and flows with our interests. But it takes all of us, all of our talents and interests, and commitments to make our human quilt what it is.

Take time to reflect and think about how truly special this is.

50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system.		
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults. Given to Se- cret Santa, deserving seniors in local convalescent hospitals, & others.		
Doll Quilts	For little girls & boys. We collect them throughout the year and do- nate during the holidays.

2015 Wine Country Quilts Show Entries

You have one month to get your quilt show entries in before the February 6th deadline date to get the \$5 entry fee waived. All entries must have both the entry form and a photo of the quilt top including boarders with accurate measurements by this date. There are entry instructions on the webpage at <u>http://www.mqsc.org/</u> <u>annual-quilt-show/quilt-show-entry-form/</u>. Between February 7th and April 4th we will continue to take entries but there is a \$5 entry fee per person.

If you take your own photos, please use adequate light or flash, so that the photo is a good to excellent representation of your project. We need color accuracy in order to arrange them correctly.

Friendship Blocks

HI there! Let me introduce myself. I am Cheryl Dudlev, your new Friendship Block committee chair. I have two helpers: Mary Nurmi and Marlene Sullivan. It really does take 3 people to replace Phyllis Galloway! Please bear with us as we "learn the ropes". We had no idea how involved this can be. Phyllis made it look so easy.

Explanation of program. The FB program is a "time release' block exchange. This means that every block you receive must be offset with a FB credit that you can acquire in one of the

ways listed below (or, in other words, "there is no free lunch".) Anyone with at least 3 credits may request up to 20 blocks to be made for them. Think of this as "borrowing" the other 17 credits from the bank so you can get your blocks early. If you actually



receive 20 blocks, 3 of these are offset by your qualifying 3 credits – but then you OWE the bank the other 17 credits.



The 3 ways which you can earn credits are: make a FB for someone else (includes community quilt block requests), make a block for the opportunity quilt, or make a block for the President's gift.

All requests are described on the FB page of our website, and instructions may be

downloaded from that page. All blocks will be introduced by group email, through Sharon Fry, with instructions attached. If the block involves distribution of fabric, you may pick up kits from Cheryl, Mary or Marlene at any meeting.

To start the year off with a "bang" we will be having a FB

raffle. There will be 3 sets of 20 credits raffled offtickets \$1 each or 6 for \$5. Tickets will go on sale at the January 15, 2015 meeting and both meetings in February. The drawing will be on February 19, 2015 after everyone has had the opportunity to buy those last minute tickets! Raffle tickets will be sold at one of the back tables where Cheryl, Mary and Marlene will be sitting.

Those of you who know me also know that I have a real soft spot for our elders. If you had ridden along with me to deliver a few quilts and some fidget aprons this week, you might see where my passion lies.

It was a rainy Tuesday in Petaluma. Sam's Residential Care Home (none of these names are real, but

the story is true) is showing its age on the outside. The grass needs to be cut, it could use a paint job, and water was pouring through the rusted gutters. But when Sam opened the door, it was the same, clean, quiet place that I remember from @ visiting a couple years ago. Greta sat in the same chair paying her bills; she even remembered me ... I think ... The house calico cat was sprawled out on the couch beside her and accepted my overtures of a scratch under the chin. Sam called out for Tom who was in his room reading. He wheeled himself out

and immediately recognized me. Two residents I did not know were sitting in the living area watching TV ... or sleeping ...

As the past Long Term Care Ombudsman for the facility, I turned to Sam for help resolving some challenging cases, including Tom's. His house is always clean, and you can tell there is love ... not just from Sam, but among the folks who live there.

We gathered in the living area and Sam made all the introductions. My original thought was that Sam would give the quilts out closer to Christmas, but he gave me the privilege of handing them out while we were all there. Anne Dondero gave me 20 quilts to pass out to seniors, and there was an amazing variety of styles, themes and fabrics.

Greta, who loves antiques, was so well suited for the jewel toned velvet quilt with the heavy brown back. Tom smiled, said he would like one that wouldn't be too heavy on his legs ... there was the perfect flannel "man's" quilt for him. This was the first time I met Mary, but she was wearing pink and has one of those pink complexions, so I gave her a bright, flowery, springy quilt. She draped it over her walker and her entire focus centered on the quilt as her fingers persistently explored all the textures.

Then there is Doris – she wouldn't look at me, very shy and quiet, seeming to have no expectations in life, wasn't sure why she should be included. Sam quickly let me know that Doris' hearing was very poor. The only way she could hear is if you spoke directly into her left ear. As I handed her the well quilted, small brown and white quilt with two lions in the center, she let me place it in her hands and she stared at it. I leaned over to her left ear and spoke loudly, "Merry Christmas!" Not certain why anyone would just *give* her anything, she asked "How much will it cost?" I said "Nothing." She held onto it tightly and said, "No one has ever given me anything like

> this." As she held tight to the quilt, she stared at it and then at me. She smiled and quietly said, "Merry Christmas." As I said goodbye to the group, my last look was that of Doris holding onto this little brown quilt as if it were her most cherished treasure.

> I delivered three Fidget Aprons to Petaluma Nursing Home a few weeks ago. The administrator emailed me with a request from Anne, one of her nurses, who is raising a five-year old daughter who has autism. After seeing the results of the fidget aprons with her resi-

dents who experience severe memory loss, Anne knew that would be a perfect fit for her daughter as well. I made the request to the guild, and Lorna Fiori presented me with a great burgundy Fidget with lots of Minkie and a blue teddy bear hidden in a bee washing mitt sewn onto the apron. Anne was like a little kid when I handed it to her. She checked out all the zippers and velcro and pockets, rings and textures, looked up at me and said, "No matter what I get her for Christmas, this will be her very favorite." Because of her autism, Anne's daughter chews everything and reaches out for anything textural. Anne is so grateful to have something to offer her that will keep her engaged.

I think we tend to support Community Quilts by faith of a sort, faith that the quilts will have a positive impact on the recipient's life, but we seldom have the opportunity to know who that is or how they react.

I consider myself to be very blessed to have the direct contact with the people who receive our quilts; to look in their eyes and see on their face how incredibly important it is that we do the loving work that we do.

I am so very grateful for all of you.
