President's Message

"You can't connect the dots looking forward; you can only connect them looking backwards. So you have to trust that the dots will somehow connect in your future. You have to trust in something – your gut, destiny, life, karma, whatever. This approach has never let me down, and it has made all the difference in my life." – Steve Jobs (via <u>Quiltfolk</u>, Issue 02, available in the SRQG library).

Steve Jobs might have become a great quilter, if he hadn't made his fortune with a little keyboard inven-

tion. Even though he was very successful with his visions, I challenge his statement, at least in part. As quilters, we *can* connect the dots looking forward as we are quilting, by using markings as targets for where we want to go with our quilting pattern. A picky point, I know, and not at all the global thought Mr. Jobs espoused, but his words do apply to those of us who enjoy the process of creating quilts.

To apply his statement to quilting on a more global level, he may also be saying that you needn't look back on your work and be remiss about the "mistakes." Looking backwards, you can "connect the dots" as to why your points don't match, or why your binding is wonky ... but that doesn't mean you should go back and fix it. As we so often hear, the quilter is the only one who knows the "mistake" is there, and as long as said quilter keeps their mouth shut, most likely no one else will notice the error, but will continue to heap praise on a beautiful quilt. There are no mistakes, only creative license.

The challenge for us is to be fearless and to trust our gut as to where our next project is headed. Some of us prefer to use patterns



and stick closely to them. Some of us use quilt kits where all the decisions have been made for color, fabric, and pattern. Others of us may just find a bit of fabric that inspires us and hit our stash to find its complement. Some approach quilting with a combination of inspirations, but everything we create is *inspired*. Every project provides a learning experience and gives us more confidence in our abilities. Even though we don't know what the future brings, we trust in our instincts and perspective and know that the outcome of the process will be a success.

"Learning to live in the present and say 'yes' to life's unknowns ... can lead you down a road in life that you could never have imagined." – Michael McCormick, Editor-in-Chief, <u>Quiltfolk</u>.

On another note, I highly recommend that you take a look at the new issue of <u>Quiltfolk</u>, a beautifully produced magazine that is more about the journey than the destination. (Be sure to ask Sharon to add your name to the reservation list.) This edition covers a journey through lowa. It features two of my favorite quilt shops, Fern Hill <u>https://fernhill.net/</u> and Heritage Designs <u>http://heritagedesignsquiltshop.com/</u> nestled in the historic communities of the Amana Colonies. Another article visits Winterset, original home of Fons and Porter. Winterset is going through a renaissance because of the efforts of Marianne Fons and the quilting community's passion. Not only is there a destination quilt shop (run by a guy!) in Fons and Porter's old building, but also they have opened the Iowa Quilt Museum in an old JC Penney store, and have reclaimed and are renovating the old movie theater that has been sitting empty for decades. The revitalization of Winterset is an excellent example of we who quilt reaching out and helping our community. That's what it's all about.

Christine Barnes says, "I'm often asked, where do you find these fabulous fabrics?" As quilters we have endless sources, but choosing fabric with color in mind takes an awareness of basic color concepts and the qualities that make fabrics special. In this digital-image presentation and trunk show, you'll learn how to select fabrics for successful guilts and avoid pitfalls when building your stash.

"Layered Transparency"

Christine will be teaching Layered Transparency the illusion of layers of see-through color—is surprisingly easy to achieve when the values are in just the right places. In this modern minimalist quilt, light center squares seem to float above the darker shapes. Sections of gray ombré appear to flow under-



neath the blocks, enhancing the sense of light and movement. You will learn and experience color and finish with a unique one of a kind quilt.

The workshop will be held at the Luther Burbank Art and Garden Center on Yulupa Avenue in Santa Rosa on August 18th from 9-4. Set up begins at 8:30. The cost of the workshop is \$40 plus \$10 for the pattern.

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April Sproule Workshop

It was another glorious day in the gardens of Luther Burbank Art and Garden Center at 2050 Yulupa Ave in sunny Santa Rosa California. Santa Rosa Quilt Guild hosts approximately 10 quilt-related workshops a year, sometimes more, sometimes fewer, depending. These workshops have world-class teachers, and for the July workshop the instructor was April Sproule. She specializes in fabric painting using her own line of stencils and the very best paint. She also redesigns existing garments by adding fabric, stenciling, and embroidery. She is too cute in her upcycled garments. I hope I look as adorable as she does when I reinvent my t-shirts.

One of the wonderful things about April is that she has figured out what works and what doesn't. She has tried all the paints and all the brushes and all of the stencils. There is no more guesswork or purchasing products that one will never use again. Her paints don't chip, flake, or fade. Her stencils allow for flexibility. They are easy to hold in place with plenty of area for multiple fingers and they are durable and beautiful. They clean up easily with Dawn Dishwashing Soap and a produce brush. A simple, brief soaking in soapy water and then brushing the paint off the stencil on a stainless steel cookie sheet cleans a days worth of paint revealing a like-new stencil. The stencil brushes that April recommends are boar hair with wooden handles that have a very long life. Her personal brushes are still going strong even though they have been used for so long that the paint has worn off the handles. They are easy to clean. Simply dapple the brush gently on a bar of Ivory Soap and the stencil paint melts away with running water. The class was a wonderful mix of Pointless Sisters, Moonlight Quilters, and SRQG members. I felt like I was in the company of the best and the brightest of highly skilled fabric artists in Sonoma County.

Thanks go out to Janice Rodgers and her delightful team of room moms - Wendy F. and Mary W. - for taking such very good care of the students, the teachers, and the facility. For a mere \$40.00 dollars we get six and a half hours of instruction by amazing teachers in a lovely garden environment. If this doesn't make you want to take a workshop maybe the supply of chocolate will...
