Merit Award Recipients

Only half of the team (Jan Westerman and Toni Anderson) was on hand to receive the enthusiastic applause, and we will publicly acknowledge the others (Alana Colburn and Genelle Voorhees) in the near future.

Here I quote what Cathy Conover, the nominator, wrote:

"The planning for the March 2019 Tri-Guild Luncheon began in January 2018. For an entire year these ladies were planning the not-to-be-forgotten **Mad Hatter's Tea Party**. They selflessly dedicated countless hours and worked tirelessly to make the luncheon enjoyable for all that attended. Nothing was overlooked in the planning, from the design of the invitations to the block instructions, to the table decorations, to the room decorations, to the props,

to the hostess gifts, to the menu, to the desserts, to the individually made tea bags, to the serving pieces, to the aprons, to the Master of Ceremonies, to the many beautifully made gift baskets – it was truly a ten out of ten event."

Cathy Conover obtained more than the number of required signatures for the nomination, and the Awards Committee recommended the MAs for approval by the Elected Board, which, of course, unanimously consented as we worked around Genelle and Toni (board members) to keep it a secret.

Vicki David and Sue Gragg A Journey Through My Quilting Life

On October 17, two of our guild members, Vicki David and Sue Gragg, will present a trunk show of quilts they have made over the years.



Vicki began quilting when her daughter Kim left college. Vicki put her blood, sweat, and tears into that quilt, but Kim didn't take it with her. She wanted to make a quilt that incorporated all the fabrics from clothes she had made for Kim over the years. Since Vicki came

from a family of sewers she thought the process would be an easy transition! She loves buying fabrics for quilts vs. just buying fabric. When taking quilting classes, Vicki always followed instructions. In one of her first quilt classes she was told to sandwich and hand quilt the quilt. She bought a stencil and marked her quilt. Vicki sat on the edge of the bed and hand quilted the stenciled pattern. As with all stencils there are gaps in the designs that are considered part of the continuous design. However, if you look at that quilt, Vicki stopped and started at each and every gap! But from that point on Vicki's talents have emerged! She does excellent appliqué and has won several awards!

Sue began sewing about the age of 4 years old when her mother gave her a bunch of wash cloths to sew together. Then at nap time her mother unstitched all of them! Sue told her mother "if you want them sewed together, then you do it!" Her mother gave her knitting needles and Sue began knitting

until the age of 9. Shortly thereafter, her grandmother came for a visit and brought along a bag of scraps. Her grandmother taught Sue how to make templates out of cereal boxes. Sue learned that you never make just one template as it will wear down after several uses so during that visit, Sue made many templates!! She felt like she was in heaven with all of those scraps. However, when her grandmother left she took the scraps with her! Sue's mother didn't sew but Sue knew the neighbor women did. She went to the neighbors and begged for scraps. The neighbors called Sue's mother and that put an end to her early quilting career! When Sue was about 29, she started thinking about making quilts and that's when she called and asked about joining the Santa Rosa Quilt Guild. Back then, members had to be "approved." They told her "no!"



Sewlutions

Recently I had an opportunity to go to a quilt retreat with some very wonderful and creative ladies. Since I had a virtual treasure trove of talent all together in one place, I thought it would be a great time to gather some favorite tips and tricks to share with you. If only I had known half of these tricks when I first started quilting!

Take a pipe cleaner and run it through a straw, form a small ball on the end of the pipe cleaner. Use that to clean your bobbin case and other areas of your sewing machine ~ Carolle LeMonnier

Two-gallon storage bags make a perfect small project carrier ~ Sharon Bower

Always sew a test piece before you begin a project ~ Carol Reed

Move your ironing board away from your sewing table to make sure you get some steps in while you are working ~ Linda Emis

Keep your red wine away from your white fabric. White wine close to red fabric is just fine ~ Linda Silva

If you are drawing on fabric, place it on sandpaper to hold it in place ~ Lori Platt

Place a 3-pound weight on your ruler for stability ~ Carol Elliott

Do your fabric cutting during the day not at night when you are tired and the lighting is not as good ~ Jean Sasso

Your long-armor will love you if you measure your borders before you sew them on ~ Joanie Bellinghausen

Make your squares more uniform by sewing two same sized squares together, then cutting the top and peeling it back ~ Genelle Voorhees (see photo)


You can easily paper piece curves by pleating the curve into the fabric ~ Cydney Doerres (see photo)

And my personal favorite: Sew with a loose bottom. (I have to admit I was all ears to hear this tip!) If you have two blocks and one is a wee bit larger, sewing it to the bottom of the one that is smaller will allow the sewing to ease the seams of the blocks together ~ Elaine Tucker.




A helpful hint about "water soluble" blue markers:

When you use a blue water soluble pen on your quilt, **DO NOT** iron on it or it will become permanent.

To make sure that the markings will completely disappear, spray them with a solution made of **1 cup of cold/ice water** with a **heaping teaspoon of baking soda**. The baking soda will change the pH of the ink and it will not reappear.



Also, a thank you to Linda Silva for giving our guild the next-larger size of cutter and many dies that she won in a raffle. Reserve the machines and dies just like a library book. Our brand new library items:

CLASSIC TO CONTEMPORARY STRING QUILTS

by Mary M. Hogan – After reading this book that Pam Brown recommended for our library you will never again throw away a fabric "string." Traditional blocks are re-imagined with stash-busting techniques.

CREATING ART QUILTS WITH PANELS by Joyce Hughes – Chris Nolen suggested this book for our library. Tips for enhancing purchased panels with thread painting, trapunto, embroidery, and other embellishments. Some excellent information about exactly which threads to use in the top and bobbin of our machines.

BLOCK – VOLUME 6, ISSUE 4, 2019 – A HOLIDAY ISSUE! – by Jenny Doan of the Missouri Star Quilt Company – included: a sampler featuring gnomes, gift packages, and trees; a giant heart; Christmas Tree Pinwheel; and lots of ideas for scraps and/or pre-cuts. A very nice donation for our library.

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter and Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, and teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fabrics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system, and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults to be handed out by Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convalescent hospitals, and others.
Doll Quilts	For little girls and boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.





