Program: "Silk and Salvage - Where's the Cotton? Exquisite Quilts Made with Unexpected Materials"

The program presentation at our meeting on October 15 will be presented by Julia McLeod from Silk and Salvage.

"Before easy access to the local quilt shop, before internet shopping, how and where did one obtain materials for quilt making? And once a quilt-maker





had a collection of available materials, how did those materials influence design and construction? What can we learn from quilts made with a restricted supply or unusual types or sizes of materials?"

"We'll take a wide-ranging look at quilts made from silk, linen, wool, and other fabrics, such as clothing and manufacturing scraps ... as well as quilts made during times of privation and necessity. This talk showcases both historical and contemporary makers, and highlights some pretty awesome quilts. The trunk show includes both vintage pieces and some of our own work."

Workshop: “Japanese Boro Sashiko Stitching”

On November 19, Carol Ziogas, will present “Japanese Fabric and Quilts.” Carol's real love is fabric. She buys it, imports it, sells it, and collects ancient Japanese quilts. She says the Japanese make the very best textiles on the market today, and even the older pieces are still fabulous as they were made to last.



Carol owns a large Etsy shop and Studio store in her home in Alameda. In between all of that, she manages to teach quilting classes and lead trips for quilters to Japan. Many of our members have discovered her at PIQF selling her fabulous Japanese textiles.

Join Carol in her presentation about all the interesting things she does. You won't want to miss this.

Workshop - Friday, November 20

“Japanese Boro Sashiko Stitching”

Boro Sashiko – “Work with scraps to create something new. Based on historical samples of boro from my personal collection, we'll take bits of this and that, add needle and thread, and make a highly tactile art piece. Beginner to intermediate.”



This workshop will be, taught live online by Zoom. A Zoom format is necessary during our shutdown, but actually is an advantage for this type of class. You will have a front row seat to clearly see what the teacher is doing. At the same time, you will have access to the teacher as a live class to ask questions, get help when needed, and learn with other Guild friends.

With a LOT of help from Joy McGoran, Mary Wood, Genelle Voorhees, and whoever else steps up to volunteer, we are trying an experiment on Wednesday, September 30. We are taking a cue from the Sonoma County Library system and will deliver library items to your vehicle as you drive up to the entrance to our storage building. We will be open from 11:00 a.m. until 1:30 p.m.

As this newsletter can be accessed by people all over the world, I am not giving particulars here as to the name of our storage unit, its address, or my email address. If you have questions, please consult your guild roster and email me. Yes, I prefer emailing as there seems to be a gremlin in my home that occasionally accidentally deletes phone messages from the machine, especially if he is trying to nap – and I hate missing calls.

Log on to our guild's website at www.srqq.org Click on “Library” on the left side. You will arrive at the Library's Home Page. There you will find a list of our newest acquisitions. If you do not see what you wish, use the SEARCH box near the top of the page. Having trouble? At the top of the home page go to the link of the very helpful tutorial Linda Hooper wrote on how to use our library's website. Still can't find what you want? Email me.

Bear with me as this is an experiment. If all goes well and we don't tick off the employees at the storage facility, we will try this service again in a couple of weeks. Watch for my emails and articles in the SRQG newsletter, if all goes well, to see if and when we can repeat this.

Email me by 4:00 p.m., Tuesday, September 29, 2020, with your requests so that I will have time to research to see if your library items have already been spoken for. If that is the case, your name will

be added to the reserve list. I will respond to you so that you do not have to make a trip and go home disappointed. You will not be limited to the number of items you request. And of course, it will be so nice if the items can be returned at our next library day.

This is also a good time for you to return library items so that we can process them and be prepared to offer them at our next library session. If you have items but cannot visit us on the 30th, email me and I will see if there might be a person in your neighborhood who can pick them up. Or if you have a group of friends in your area, maybe you can assign one to make the trip to drop off and pick up.

Be advised that there is no cell service at the storage unit, so we will not be able to take calls while at the library.

We will be wearing masks and gloves, and we all hope that everyone involved will be super careful to keep everyone safe from the dreaded deadly virus. So far as I know, none of our guild members has contracted COVID – let's keep it that way.

GO!Me – the newest and smallest version of the Accuquilt cutting machines – As our guild has been such a good customer, Accuquilt treated us to this little 8.5 pound machine, plus two dies; one for cutting "Animal Buddies" (a piglet, owl, and frog) #55333, and "Owl Accessories/Posy Hair Tie, #55675, and a packet of felts for the projects. The first person to check out these dies may use the felt fabrics! Plus: a 6 x 6" cutting mat! This little cutter will accommodate dies that are 5 x 10, 6 x 12, 6 x 6, and even 6 x 24." Like its bigger sisters, it can cut up to six layers of quilting cotton at a time. This complete package is a \$129.99 value that we received for absolutely zilch! I will have this little GO! Me at the storage unit Wednesday the 30th, but for all other GO! items, contact Jan Westerman who is kindly storing them at her home.

And don't forget that we have magazine subscriptions to:

FONS AND PORTER'S LOVE OF QUILTING, AMERICAN QUILTER, QUILTING ARTS MAGAZINE, and MODERNE (from Quiltmania).

SEW – think about what techniques you want to learn, what might inspire you, which quilt-related novels you have been thinking about trying, and search through our stack via the website. 

Sew-a-Row



Would you like to try a new technique, color scheme, or theme that you might not normally do? Sew-a-Row is a great way to stretch, create, and give something new a try. Since you only have to do one row or round, the time commitment is minimal.

How it works:

1. Check the website for the rows in the program and look for something you would like to add a row to. Each Sew-a-Row will have a total of five rows when complete.
2. Contact Ann Nolen to arrange to sign them out.
3. Our committee is offering curb-side pickup and drop off from our homes in Santa Rosa, Healdsburg, and Cloverdale. If that doesn't work for you, we can help brainstorm a solution.
4. Our goal is to finish all five rows on each project by December 1. A drawing will be held in December 2020 to determine which participating quilter will win the completed project.

Block-of-the-Month

Well, when we started this year's BOMs, we promised "seasonal blocks." What can be more seasonal than pumpkins in the month of October? So get your orange fabrics out that's way in the back of your fabric stash – it's there, just keep looking. Get three to six different colors that you can stomach and cut six strips (if one is just a hint of orange, that's okay too ... too much orange is ... well too much orange.) Sew them together and that's all the orange you'll have to deal with. Add some brown for the stem and a green leaf to a light background and there you go – a sweet little pumpkin for the Halloween season. Enjoy! Make lots! If you win them and orange is not your "thing," they can easily be converted to next year's sew-a-row, OR beautiful placemats, OR maybe you'll end up liking orange! Try it.

Hip To Be Square is described as the perfect soundtrack for your sewing room. Each episode tackles a different topic with Pam and Lynn, self-described quilting nerds.

Connecting Threads podcast is hosted by Kate and the Creative Threads team, with stories, interviews, tips and tricks and other quilt related chatter.

The Off Kilter Quilts hosts Francis, who shares stories of her life and quilt experiences, her family and her dog. She is also a writer of quilt fiction. She also reads quilt stories of her own and other writers on **The Quilt Fiction Podcast**.

Community Quilts

Santa Rosa Quilt Guild will be working together to distribute quilts to Fire Survivors of the current local fires. We will coordinate this effort in a similar manner as the efforts in the past years. The Community Quilts Committee will be organizing the effort for the Fire Quilts.



Fortunately our efforts were jump started by the receipt of 10 beautiful tops from a woman named Bettie, who lives in El Cajon, Ca. She shares our passion for quilting and makes a variety of quilt tops. When she has a 'box full of tops', Bettie looks to see who might need them. She sent an email to SRQG explaining she had these tops and would like them to go to fire survivors. Pam Beebe contacted Bettie to tell her we would love these tops and we would be sure they were finished and given to fire survivors.



What we are asking our members is three things. First is to tell us if you know of someone who lost their home in the current fires and you feel would benefit by the donation of a quilt. Second is to donate finished quilts and/or quilt tops (minimum size 40"x60") We prefer to receive finished quilts to be donated if possible. Third is to volunteer to turn the donated quilt tops into finished quilts. Community Quilts will provide the quilt top, backing, and batting.

As our meetings are on Zoom and not in person, it will take a bit more creativity and time to coordinate this effort. Now that we have had some practice with the Virtual Quiltathon, it will be a bit easier to manage. We ask everyone to be patient and keep your sense of humor as this process evolves.

(Keep in mind that the member requesting the quilt will also deliver the quilt to the fire survivor.)

COMMUNITY QUILT SIZES

If you are making donation quilts on your own, these are the approximate sizes most needed.

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter and Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, and teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fabrics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system, and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults to be handed out by Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convalescent hospitals, and others.
Doll Quilts	For little girls and boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.

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

