President's Message

One of our members recently asked me, "Why did the Board decide to continue charging \$35 for its yearly dues during Covid when we could not meet in-person?" I presented this question to our board members and they answered, collectively and overwhelmingly, "We love the guild and believe it is worthwhile to continue supporting it." The board also mentioned many of the continuing unknown costs and fees for:

- renting space to hold our meetings and workshops when we can again meet in-person;
- purchasing fabrics and batting for Community Quilts which have become more expensive, resulting in an increased budget;
- paying increased insurance fees;
- covering the growing demand for Fire quilts in our community, which has seen more need in the past four years and is likely to increase in the foreseeable future.

On the downside:

- there have been fewer funds flowing into our guild in the past 13 months as donations from organizations and individuals have greatly diminished;
- our silent auctions and boutique sales, present at every past meeting and the June Quilt Show, are non-existent;
- our storage fees for the library, community quilts, record archives, quilting supplies like irons and ironing boards, quilt racks, and microphone equipment experienced a significant increase when we moved from the Scottish Rite;
- many Guest Speakers have increased their fees, and fewer participants are signing up for workshops as in past years.

With Covid looming over us the past year, we purchased a Zoom contract to keep our guild moving forward with many meetings during the past eight months. These are just some of the great programs we continue to offer:

- Mystery Quilts
- Community Quilts
- Sew-A-Rows (SAR)
- Show-and-Tell
- Stitch'n Times Newsletters
- Placemats project
- Technique Sharing Workshops (TSW)
- Library (and More) Days!
- Programs and Workshops
- Board Meetings
- An occasional 5th Thursday Retreat
- Opportunity Quilt Program

We are also supporting special projects as requested from our members, not to mention the thousands of masks made for our community, family, and friends to help stop the pandemic.

We want to inspire our members to sew, quilt, and continue their loving support of our guild and community. I am very proud to be your president and say "THANK YOU" to all our new members, and to those dedicated members who have continued supporting us through these difficult times.

Opportunity Quilt

Our beautiful new 2021 Opportunity Quilt, **FIESTA**, was unveiled in April. Here is more information about it:

- The drawing for this quilt will be April 7, 2022,
- Suggested donation for tickets is \$1.00 each or 10 for \$5.00
- Winner need not be present to win.
- You can take as many tickets as you like but stubs and monies must be turned in together. No need to prepay for the tickets.
- A new feature on the tickets this year is a “scan code,” you use your camera on your cell phone to align with the scan code, you will then receive a message at the top of your phone screen that will direct you to the Guild website. Touch the message to open the link and you will see a picture of the quilt and its history. This is a great opportunity to show the quilt to your family, friends, and neighbors in case they would like to purchase some tickets.
- We will begin distributing tickets beginning on Library (and More) Day , April 29, 2021, at the storage location,
- We have envelopes with one book of tickets for every member of the guild. We will distribute these by having someone available at the Library Day events, or have members take envelopes to the other members in their neighborhood. We'll have our table set up with the quilt and distribute tickets at our meetings, when we are able to meet again.

2021 Quilt Challenge





Block 4 = 4 completed


Block 6 = 4 completed

Library

Sew-lutions



Choosing a thread for quilting can be a quandary for a quilter. Do you know which thread is best for your projects? I did some research and opinions do vary on this subject. I found an article written by long time quilter and teacher, Catherine Redford, to be very helpful in spelling out her thoughts on how to choose the right thread for the right project.

She suggests using a fine two-ply 50 or 60 weight thread for piecing. It allows her to sew a true quarter inch seam. She adds that it is best to use the same weight in the top and the bottom while sewing to maintain good tension throughout.

For quilting she suggests considering the thread choice depending on your desired overall look. You can use the same thread that you used for piecing, and a 50 weight is nice if you want to see all the stitches. But on the other hand, an 80 or even a 100-weight thread is better if you want the stitches to settle into your quilt top. Choosing a similar color will allow you to add texture, and you can quilt densely without worrying about thread buildup. If you want to add color and have your stitching really show up, move to a thicker 30 weight thread. Want to go bolder yet? Try a 12-weight thread. Just remember the higher the thread weight, the finer the thread.

Baby Closet

Lombardi Campus in Roseland

The load-in has begun! The closet is filling up with baby booty and I cannot wait to share the photos when it is stocked. By the looks of my living room/warehouse the closet will be full in time for opening day on May 1. This is so exciting!

April turned out swell for the babies, their siblings, and their mothers. My friend, Tina W., purchased 19 outfits from newborn to 18 months. She was in Oregon where there is no sales tax, so she went into Costco and bought bulk. Once home, all of it was laundered and bagged according to size. There is so much kindness and thought in these wonderful gifts.



My brother, Ryan, and his gal left 38 pairs of socks on the porch, which inspired me to bite the bullet. I purchased socks from Amazon - 88 pair for a total of 126 pairs of socks from newborn to 3-T. I feel better about the socks now.

My friend, Pam B., dropped off seven lovely hardcover journals which makes a total of 77 that have come in. That is half of our annual target of 140. Yippy!

My friend, Charlotte, donated three bath sheets and matching hand towels in pink, blue and beige. From one towel I made six plush bibs - which is great because terry cloth is pricey even with a coupon. I acquired four additional yards from Joanne.com and made 24 bibs. I like the towels better because they are plush whereas the Joanne terry cloth is only okay. Babies are just going to burp on them. I do not know why I am being fussy about it.

I have made five of my bag sets to augment the bags already made. The clinic has requested 10 bags per month. I know I can make four a month. There are three empty quilted bags waiting in the wings that can be filled on-site from the inventory in the closet. There are individ-

ual items such as socks, journals, receiving blankets, bibs, sweetie cats with dolly blankets and post cards with encouraging words. I made four sets of 50 for 200 uplifting beautiful post-cards. Now my task is to have them translated into Spanish. I am gifting the closet children's books that my kids and grandkids grew up with.

May's **challenge** is the **cat stuffy and small dolly blanket**. Each

bag has this set. The toddlers and preschool age children get the stuffy, dolly blanket, socks, (and books, while they last). Now, if one is inspired to make cats and blankies but does not want to mess with stuffing, I have a 10 lb. box of it here. Make the stuffy according to the instructions on the guild website:

Click the TSW page and scroll down to Rhonda Denny's Community Project where each item can be found. Clip the corners and curves, turn them inside out, then get it/ them to me. I am happy to stuff them myself if you do not want to mess with that part. These small, faceless kittens are super easy and very quick to make. So far, I have made 25 just in April alone. The blankets can be as simple or complicated as you like. I made one from red velour that is a rectangle. (Thank you, Diana C, for the red material.)

For those of you that find this project important and meaningful to the recipients please consider making something for them. For me when I was young, barefoot, and pregnant the handmade goods for my children inspired me to sew. I have gifted handmade baby goods ever since.

Please remember that items for the Baby Closet can be dropped off at Village Sewing Center. Just let me know that you dropped them there for pick-up as soon as possible. I will be joining Sharon Fry and her library crew on the next Library (and More) Day. If you have any questions or concerns, please call or email me. (My contact information is in the guild roster.)

If you are making donation quilts on your own, these are the approximate sizes most needed.

32" x 40" Baby Quilts	For Sutter and Memorial NICUs, Public Health nursing, and teen moms. We provide kits for making the tops, or you may use your own fabrics.
40" x 60"	For Valley of the Moon and other organizations serving children in need. Please use bright colors for young children or fabrics that will appeal to teenagers.
50" x 65"	For 18 year olds aging out of the Foster Care system, and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults to be handed out by Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convalescent hospitals, and others.
Doll Quilts	For little girls and boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.




