Dear Guild Members,

Every Founders' Day our guild recaps the prior year. It is a reminder of another year gone by, and for me it is a transition and reflection time -- a not so gentle reminder that time marches on whether we like it or not. We ponder the guild's challenges and accomplishments, and then move on to reflecting on our own lives and what we have done, while mourning those we have loved and lost. It stays with me long after the closing gavel.

We have been on this journey together connecting through emails, phone calls, Zoom Meetings, Library (and More) Days, and our committee projects for a long time. We have created and worked diligently and done so much together to keep our guild afloat the past three years with major events: finding a facility that works for us after losing our beloved Scottish Rite facility; finding storage for our library and moving our massive library and guild paraphernalia to an off-site facility; fires year after year that have impacted all of us, especially those who lost everything; the Covid-19 pandemic and mask making activities, and possible variants to come; the "Stay at Home" mandates, and more. It has been a difficult time for all of us.

Good news! Our September test of having in-person meetings and Zoom 'live-streaming' has been a success. We had a couple of minor bumps, but it allowed our members to decide if they want to meet in person (with masks and proof of vaccination) or watch from other locations via Zoom. Our General Meetings (first meeting of each month) are recorded and are available on our SRQG.org website under BLOG. They can be watched via our website for several days after the meeting.



"CHAT" ETIQUETTE ON ZOOM

The CHAT feature on Zoom allows everyone on Zoom to make comments or ask questions. CHAT has worked well, particularly for Speaker Meetings and Workshops where the Speaker can take a break from his/her presentation to ask the Co-Host if there are any questions, and answer them at their chosen time. This same feature will work best during general meetings and Board meetings if it is used with the same meeting decorum as it is with a Speaker Meeting.

Many members have concerns that while on Zoom, the chat feature during the speaker's presentation can be distracting. The pop-ups can take the attention away from the person speaking. In order to accommodate Zoom questions and observations, while respecting the person speaking, please direct a text to an appointed Co-Host, who will monitor the urgency of the question, to determine what can be answered immediately vs what can wait until the end of the meeting when we will ask for questions. Think of it as raising your hand at a meeting and being called upon when it is your turn. At the conclusion of the meeting, chat will be open for general discussion as it would be at a physical meeting. Being respectful will go a long way to helping our guild begin a process of coming together in the spirit it once was before Covid. Keep in mind that CHAT cannot be seen at the physical meeting.

Awards



“Double Friendship Knot”

This is a machine sewing and handwork class, taught by Sheri Cifaldi-Morrill of Whole Circle Studio.




Learn how to make the Double Friendship Knots mini-quilt (18” x 18”). This block incorporates foundation paper piecing on a machine and hand needle-turn appliqué. In the first class, students will foundation paper piece their “scrappy knots” using a sewing machine. In the second class, we’ll slow it down and kick back with some handwork learning how to prepare the appliqué and how to apply the layered motif by alternating basting and needle-turn appliqué techniques. Along the way, Sheri will share all of her tips and tricks for both foundation paper piecing and needle-turn appliqué. When complete, students can make their mini-quilt into a wall hanging or pillow. It makes an excellent gift for a friend, partner, or special couple.

All skill levels, confident beginner to advanced, are welcome! Previous experience with foundation paper piecing is helpful, but not required.

No kit required - use your stash! Pattern included in price of class.

The history of the Baltimore Album Quilt is a fascinating journey into an America headed for the Civil War. Discover how the Industrial Revolution, the struggle over slavery, and the social and moral climate of the time contributed to this beautiful art form.

Through stories, Jaimie will explore how the demise of Baltimore Album quilts leads us into the hearts and minds of the women who made them, and find out how a pregnancy, a Christmas gift, and a quilt class gone horribly wrong helps to explain the mystery of why these quilts disappeared almost overnight. It's a funny, provocative, and insightful look into some of America's most beautiful treasures.

Formerly a scientist, Jaimie Davis is an award-winning quilter who began quilting in 1993. In addition to making quilts, she designs patterns, kits, and technique-based workshops and travels widely to teach for quilt guilds, retreats, and quilting festivals.



Her work has been shown in national and international exhibits including the International Quilt Show in Houston, Texas and the Pacific International Quilt Festival in Santa Clara, California.

Mystery Quilt

It's time to reveal the lay out of the 9-patch mystery quilt.

I hope that you enjoyed the journey of block making, and will also enjoy the final process of assembly.

When I first did this mystery, we were able to meet together in a room that was large enough so that we could all lay out our blocks and have a grand

viewing! This is something I had hoped for us as well, but that just isn't in the cards.





So, let's move on to the lay out.

I would suggest before you start sewing these rows together that you lay out the entire quilt as you might want to move a block or two around for a more placement pleasing view.



Jan Westerman was gracious enough to use her EQ software to make a lay out for you to follow. The colored view she created should help you with the proper block orientation for the final design. (See TSW at <http://www.santaroquiltguild.org/tsw.php>.)

Blocks are set on point and there are 13 rows. Rows 1-7 will be sewed together as one unit, and rows 8-13 the second unit. The final seam will be sewing Unit 1 (1-7) to Unit 2 (8-13).

Once you have selected the blocks that you want in each row, you will need to cut the corner setting triangles from your remaining background fabric(s). See the notes at the end for cutting suggestions.*

Rows 6 and 8 do NOT have a setting triangle on the RIGHT side of the row.

Note the orientation of the setting triangle on the right side of Row 7 (it is where you will be turning the corner).**

Sew the rows together 1 – 7 and 8 – 13.

Sew the two units together and add the four corner triangles and your quilt top is complete.

If you chose to use 3-1/2" squares, the cutting instructions are as follows:

***Cutting setting triangles:** Cut each of the six 16-1/2" squares on both diagonals, creating 24 setting triangles.


****Cutting the corners:** Cut each of the 11" squares in half on ONE diagonal, creating four corner triangles. Set aside until completing the top.

Thank you for taking on this mystery. I hope you enjoyed the process, that you used up some of your favorite fabrics, and you enjoy your quilt as much as I do mine.

Sewlutions ...

Are you a beginner quilter and not sure where to start? Here is a helpful shopping list of ten of the most useful tools for beginners.

Fabric scissors: Choose a lightweight pair that fits comfortably in your hand, yet is long enough to slice through quilting fabric.

Rotary cutter and replacement blades: The two most common rotary cutter sizes for general quilting have 45 mm and 60 mm blades. Try out both to see which you like best

A self-healing cutting mat: Pick the largest cutting mat you have space for. It makes it easier to spread out your fabric without damaging your table underneath.

A seam ripper: No matter your skill level, you will need one.

An acrylic ruler: With their see-through material and easy-to-read markings, acrylic rulers make measuring a breeze so you can accurately cut your fabric.

A basic sewing machine and feet: You only need a basic machine to start quilting. If you plan to quilt and bind your quilt, you will also need a walking foot.

Thread: When starting out, get a few neutral colors that can be used with many fabrics. Light and medium gray go with many colors, so they can be a good beginner's go to.

Pins and a pincushion: Get sharp and sturdy pins, and either a magnetic pin bowl or pincushion to store them.

Clips: for securing your binding, or holding block layers together.

Needles: A sharp needle can make all the difference in the ease of piercing a fabric.

Now you have a nice supply of basics, and you can dive right in to your project with everything you need to complete your beginning quilts. Other goodies will eventually find their way into your sewing space if you stay at it long enough, but these 10 essentials will always be your most needed tools.

Little Bits with Jackie Pitts

There is one group of people nobody has thought to blame for the condition of the world. No doubt when they are older, the children will make their share of human mistakes, but they haven't had a chance to do this yet. And it's going to be a tough year at the North Pole. Anyone assisting Santa Claus and company had better get a move on.

Toys are not for children only. Do you know anyone at all who doesn't need a socially distanced hug? If you make a stuffed toy for someone who claims to be an adult, you might have to put a pin on it and call it a brooch. Or make it a keychain. Or a pin cushion. Or a pillow. A small soft toy is very nice to give with a quilt, it looks cool peeping out of a Christmas stocking.

If you want to donate a lot of them to a worthy cause, such as Rhonda's baby closet or [Samaritan's Purse](#), or that group that equips the police with teddy bears to give to suddenly traumatized kids, consider having a "One Day Toy Factory." It can be within a family or a group of friends. A dozen or fewer people set it up assembly line style. It is similar to a Quiltathon in format. At least one person uses the sewing machine, others cut, turn, stuff, draw faces, and so on. Hand work is kept to a minimum, for this a pancake style toy, with two identical pieces, front and back, cutting on the straight of the goods, is especially helpful.

There's a new cat pattern available at [Ann Wood Handmade](#). It is free and comes in two sizes. It is a pancake and very simple to make. This design would also make a good applique, especially for a child's quilt, although it is fresh and witty enough that most adults would enjoy it. While checking out Ann Wood's freebie page, consider buying one of her lovely little paintings which often includes her cats. She also has patterns for sale and a lot of good links.



Another good free pattern for fast construction can be found at [Dolly Donation](#). This comes in two sizes and in both boy and girl versions. The hair and clothes are built in. The head and body form a unit with only two

very gentle concave. The faces can be drawn with a sharpie or other permanent pen, or appliqued, or painted with fabric paint. Dolly Donation was de-

signed by a professional toy designer who wanted to make a doll for each child in her favorite orphanage. This pattern can use a wide variety of scraps to advantage. The smaller version was sized for people who wanted to donate dolls to Samaritan's Purse. This size doll fits well into a shoe box with plenty of room for school supplies and hygiene items. When I make a cloth doll and have no idea to whom it is going, I often make it in a generic tan with dark or bright hair and eyes.

The oldest soft toy known to exist is a rag doll, about 2000 years old. She came from Egypt and now lives in the British Museum. Cloth toys of ancient and medieval times are rare, but in more recent centuries cloth toys developed as folk toys. In the East, one folk doll was made of an oblong and a circle. The circle, gathered around the edge, becomes the head and the oblong the body, arms, and legs. The Chinese version is often seen in a ring around a pin cushion. The Japanese version often wears a garment that looks like a bib or an apron. These are now used mainly to ornament something like a pin cushion or for a counting game, something like jacks. In the Ukraine, folk dolls were mainly made by rolling fabric. Some of these are elaborate and some simple. Many are beautiful. In Northern Europe, a toy making tradition gave rise to the Waldorf doll. In America, a cartoonist found an old cloth doll in his mother's attic and painted a face on it to give to his daughter. That is how we now have Raggedy Ann.

Friendship Blocks

If you check the signature at the bottom of article you will be totally confused. Yes, this is Sharon “the Librarian” Fry writing, not the Friendship Block Chair, Heidi Mitarai (and don’t tell Heidi that I am writing this, which, hopefully, will generate lots of work for her).

Receiving the surprise gift of blocks on Founders’ Day from so many guild friends as a thank you for coordinating the Library (and More) Days reminded me of the numerous Friendship Blocks (FB) I have received over the years. I am having such fun positioning the blocks on my design wall, admiring the creativity, and thinking of each of the makers.

I have probably made more FBs for others, and may have requested more FBs and created more quilts (and even a wearable) than any other guild member. If you have not participated in the FB program, you really are missing out on an excellent way to collect pieces of art from fellow guild members.

In order to request FBs you must first make three blocks for other members. And here is a classic “catch-22” – if no one is requesting FBs, no one can make blocks, and members who have never participated in the FB program cannot get into the program.

To remedy this problem, several years ago I came up with the idea to give three of my FB credits to members if the members promised to request FBs, and then of course, start making FBs for others. This enabled several people to jump into the FB program. One of those people was Fran Threewit. She immediately had us making FBs that she turned into the most adorable prize-winning Russian nesting dolls quilt you can imagine.



Some people want to make a quilt with all the same blocks, but do not want to make that same block over and over again themselves, so the person can put together kits of fabrics and instructions for others to make.

Some people desire a variety of blocks for a themed project (jars filled with bugs, or jars filled with Christmas fabrics, or jars filled with hearts; or holiday-themed blocks; and for more ideas go to our guild’s website’s Friendship Block page to see individual blocks that have been made, and then to our Show-



40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults to be handed out by Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convalescent hospitals, and others.


